- Libby is an eBook and audiobook app with popular titles (such as novels); scholarly resources and textbooks typically are NOT on Libby.
- Libby usually has a one book / one user model. This means that you must wait for a book if it is checked out.
- [Boston Public Library](#) and [Minuteman](#) have Libby; a library card or eCard is needed for access.
