

Teaching Toolkit: Making the Most out of Remote Teaching

Teaching remotely has its perks! This guide shines a light on certain advantages to teaching using online technology, and how you can maximize your new environment for yourself and your students.



Save time without a commute

- Remote instructors don't have to bother with things like traffic or parking. This can save valuable time in a day which can be spent doing other things
- Use the time you save to curate some of the many great instructional resources online for your students
- Get some extra sleep, or take a walk before class... anything to promote self-care and wellness

A new frontier of scheduling

- Typical online students enjoy being able to access the course materials when it is most convenient for them. While you may still be keeping the course meeting time via zoom, consider...
 - Making other content available one or more weeks early
 - Leaving assessments open for a few days before the due date
 This will help students choose the time of day they are most productive to do their school work.
- Use a Q&A format to collect asynchronous student questions and provide answers. This will create a valuable student resource! (Google Docs or Canvas page where "anyone can edit")

Form a different kind of community

- Create a unique hashtag for your class, and form an online community that you will have for long after the semester ends.
- Try out a new online tool. Survey your students using Canvas ungraded survey or Google forms to gain insights into their experience
