This autumn, school children in Glasgow and beyond have joined the campaign by creating their own Our Other Mother artwork.

This exhibition was placed in a popular shopping Mall in Silverburn, Glasgow and so it communicated with Glasgow's people going about their usual activities who were probably not connected with COP in any way, therefore getting the message out much further

The Climate Change Creative Project


Fadzai Mwakutuya

Stitches For Survival is an international group of knitters, crocheters, stitchers and crafters who believe it is time to put the Earth, and not money, centre stage in political decisions. The group have crafted 1.5 miles of climate messages, representing the 1.5 °C target in the Paris Agreement, which will be exhibited on Glasgow Drying Green on the 6th November. After COP26, the scarf will be repurposed into blankets for refugees and other communities who need them.














COP26 'Most Wanted' Playing Cards Ted Leeming




