THE ASSIGNMENT

You are to write a yearbook sports story. Background information and quotes have been provided for you below. The writer should determine which information and parts of the quotes are relevant and important to the story. The writer should make sure all background information provided is in their own words, not copied/pasted directly from the prompt. Students should draft their work in Google Docs, Microsoft Word or any other word processing program. Using built-in spell-check or grammar-check to assist with proofreading is allowed. Students may also use a dictionary, thesaurus and an AP Stylebook.

BACKGROUND

Over the summer, the athletic department accepted applications for students to join the Sunflower Stadium Crew, a team of students to film athletic events at the stadium, run a control room in the press box and produce the video feed for the new 35-ft. video scoreboard during soccer games, football games and track meets.

During the fourth quarter of the football game against League City, sophomore Jason Valdivia was recording the sidelines in a timeout. The Buffalo were down 14-10 and had possession of the ball inside League City territory. At 3rd and 8 with 40 seconds left on the clock, Valdivia took a step back to get a shot of a player when his foot slipped across the line and into the back of one of the officials. The referee blew his whistle and called a 15 yard penalty for unsportsmanlike conduct. The Buffalo couldn't achieve a first down on the last drive and ended the game on the penalty.

Feeling responsible for the loss, Valdivia tried to follow Head Coach Martin Wedge into the locker room to offer his apologies, but was unable to speak with him after the game. On Monday when Valdivia was in broadcast journalism class, Wedge came to visit with two players wearing their jerseys and brought him a new Buffalo T-shirt and some spirit bracelets to let him know he was still part of the team.

The Buffalo finished the season with a record of 7-3, and narrowly made the playoffs where they were eliminated in Round 1 by the Independence High School Wranglers.

Select rating.	LEAD: The writer grabs the reader's attention with the lead, featuring unique element(s) of the topic in an interesting way.	
Select rating.	FACTS: The story presents the most important facts related to the topic, eliminating non-essential information.	
Select rating.	SOURCES: The story provides the most vital reactions from a variety of attributed sources for greater development of the story.	
Select rating.	QUOTATIONS: The writer uses correct format and punctuation for direct quotes and partial quotes. Writer selects the appropriate portion and length of quotes provided in the prompt.	
Select rating.	TRANSITIONS: Writer uses informative transitions between quotations and when moving to a new topic.	
Select rating.	ORGANIZATION: The story is logically organized into short, journalistic paragraphs. The writer concludes with a strong quote and/or brings the reader back to the beginning.	
Select rating.	EDITING: The story has been closely edited for grammar, punctuation, AP Style and capitalization.	
Select rating.	WORD CHOICE: Writer's word choices emphasize specific details, action verbs and solid nouns. The writer paints pictures with his/her words and description.
