Why we collect your information

How we collect your information

We collect the data through a Chrome extension (<u>Privacy Policy</u>) called CEL Survey Study. The data is encrypted and transferred to our server over an HTTPS connection. It is saved on a server accessible only to Stanford researchers who are part of this project.

What information we collect

If you choose to participate, we will collect interactions with Twitter/X, including clicks and time spent on the platform. The data is de-identified, and we **do not** collect private information such as direct messages, account names, and notifications.

Sharing

How we share your information

No publishing: The information we collect will not be shared publicly.

Access: Raw data will only be shared only with the members of Stanford University, and service providers who need to process this information and are subject to non-disclosure obligations.

Other sharing: We may disclose any collected information when required by law, when we have your permission, when needed to protect our rights, privacy, safety, users, or the general public.
