All Randolph schools hosted eclipse events on April 8th to engage students in this rare solar event!

Randolph High School, Donovan Elementary School, JFK Elementary School, Lyons Elementary School, and Young Elementary School have been recognized as 2023-24 Project Lead The Way (PLTW) Distinguished Schools. PLTW is a national nonprofit organization that serves millions of PreK-12 students and teachers in over 12,200 schools across the U.S., aiming to make every student in every grade STEM successful.

The PLTW Distinguished School recognition honors schools committed to increasing student access, engagement, and achievement in their PLTW programs. To be eligible for the designation, schools had to meet multiple criteria in the 2022-23 school year such as the number of PLTW courses available to students, percent of students enrolled in PLTW, percentage of students taking more than one PLTW course, and efforts to ensure equitable access to PLTW courses.

PLTW programs prepare today's students for the careers of tomorrow, by not only incorporating STEM skills into their learning but building students' collaboration, teamwork and communication skills so they can be ready for whatever path they take.






We are looking forward to many field trips and fun events for our students in May, including PTO's Book Fair and a Japanese Drum Presentation!

#### Medical Detectives

In Mrs. Cardillo's PLTW Medical Detectives Class, Activity 2.5 lesson introduces students to the human body as a collection of systems. Students perform a sheep brain dissection to use their knowledge to explore, analyze evidence, and identify the cause of Central Nervous System (CNS) and Peripheral Nervous System (PNS) dysfunction. For example, students identified tumors or other neurological disorders inside the brain by justification of evidence to correlate with a patient case for real world experience. Students created educational resources to assist their patient and the community for understanding of the medical condition caused by the dysfunction.







RCMS is partnered with the One8 Foundation's Applied Learning Leadership Initiative. Applied Learning programs inspire students with innovative and engaging ways to approach academics. Recently One8 spent a day at RCMS filming teaching and learning in action.




#### Randolph High School (RHS)



#### • DEIB UPDATE:

In April, our district leadership team continued its monthly sessions with SEED (Seeking Educational Equity and Diversity). We engaged in a powerful protocol to recognize the many ways and places that privilege exists.

CODMAN SQUARE at RANDOLPH HIGH SCHOOL UPDATES







We are excited to announce several new initiatives aimed at promoting health and wellness among our students:



- New Arrival Funding: Codman is set to receive \$105,000 through our collaboration with the Brookline Center and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health to assist new arrivals with their basic needs. We will collaborate with Alpha Sanford, Director of Special Education and Student Services, to identify families in need of support.
- Bi-weekly Vaccine Clinic: We have launched a bi-weekly vaccine clinic to ensure that students have access to the required vaccines.
- Youth Health Advisory Council: We have established a Youth Health Advisory Council comprising fifteen Randolph High School students who will serve as Youth Health Ambassadors. This program aims to empower students, develop leadership and advocacy skills, and address health care topics relevant to them and their peers. The council will also act as change agents within the community.
- Logo Design Initiative: Eighteen students submitted logo designs for the Youth Health Advisory Council, with An Nguyen's design being selected by the Youth Health Ambassadors. An will receive a \$500 stipend for her design, which will be featured on apparel for the Ambassadors.

#### Grant Funding:

In partnership with the Institute for Health Equity Research, Evaluation, and Policy, a subsidiary of the Massachusetts League of Community Health Center, Mandela Yoga, and Brockton Neighborhood Health Center, we have secured funding from Harvard University's Legacy of Slavery Reparative Partnership Grant. This funding will support internships for four Randolph High School students and the establishment of a Yoga Program for students. Yoga has been shown to aid in adolescent development, enhance well-being, and alleviate stress.

In collaboration with the Mass League of Community Health Centers and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, we received funding to support the Youth Health Advisory Council and to pilot a Health Career Pathway Pilot Program. This program is designed to inspire, educate, and



prepare students for a future in the healthcare industry, with a focus on community health centers.

• Launched a Pharmacy Tech Training Program: Eight Randolph High School seniors are participating in our Pharmacy Tech Training Program, which includes certification and assistance with resume development and job applications upon completion.

#### • Internships:

- Senior Internships: Four Randolph High School seniors are completing their senior internships at Codman Square Health Center, and two students have been selected to participate in Codman's summer internship program.
- o Boston Area Health Education Center Summer Internship (BAHEC): One Randolph High School student has been selected to participate in the BAHEC summer internship Program.

#### • Student Workshops:

Sexual Health Workshop: We piloted a sexual health workshop
with the Youth Health Ambassadors and received positive feedback.
We are now working with Assistant Principal Martinez to launch
this workshop initiative with ninth and tenth graders using the
Rights, Respect, and Responsibility (3Rs) curriculum.
