Assignment Description:	
Assignment for ESL 2 Students	☐ Write a two-three paragraph letter to one of the characters telling him/her what you think about his/her actions in the book. In your letter, discuss specific events that happened in the book and tell the character what you would have done in those situations.
	☐ In two-three paragraphs, complete a "Book Buzz" that includes a summary of the book (provide the most important information), your favorite part of the book and why, and how/why you connected to the book (characters, events, and/or lesson/message).
	→ Students can choose to write or record their response using Flipgrid.

	Assignment will be scored using a rubric.
Assignment for ESL 3 Students	Assignment Description: ☐ Complete a "Character Journal" as one of the characters. Choose a character from your novel and write at least three journal entries from his or her point of view (using the first person "I"). Detail the thoughts and feelings of this character as he or she experiences the plot of your novel. Each entry should be at least one paragraph in length.
	Write a Double Entry Journal where you select FIVE important sections from your book to comment, discuss, and/or analyze. On the left side, copy down a short quote from the text that you find interesting in some way. On the right side, write your personal response: why you found that sentence(s) or quote(s) interesting, meaningful, or confusing. Each personal response should be at least three complete sentences to make sure you have thoroughly explained your thinking.
	☐ Write a two-three paragraph review explaining what you liked and disliked about the book. In your review, make sure to discuss your opinion of the characters, plot, conflicts, theme(s), and author's writing style. Include who you would recommend this book to and why.
