Executive Summary

Mostly Veteran, Secondary Teachers

Over 50% of Respondents are long-time instructors (+57% = +15 years experience), teaching in single-subject assignments at public middle / high schools (+78%).

Personal Use of Tech. Outpaces Professional:

Teachers adoption of technology in their personal lives does not necessarily transfer over into equally pronounced use in their professional processes.

Most Believe in the Instructional Value of Teacher Technology Use:

Over 80% of respondents claim that technology as an instructional planning, delivery and differentiation tool translates to High or Considerably High Instructional Value.

Over 95% claim technology can/does help them provide more diverse learning materials and in turn diversify their teaching for improved outcomes.

Little Professional Support and Coordination:

Most teachers (+88%) work in schools where there is <u>little/no - informal</u> planning and sharing on effective use of technology in the classroom. And most (+77%) say they are expected to learn new technologies on their own outside of school hours.

Student Use of the Internet Provides Motivation and Work Benefits, yet also Requires More Work for the Teacher:

Overall, respondents cited higher levels of motivation, collaboration, and student work products when using the Internet.

While more teachers feel these benefits are also coupled with more teacher work to monitor for plagiarism and use of unreliable sources, +73% feel that student access to the Internet does NOT result in increased discipline issues.

Teachers Use of Digital Curriculum / Resources Is Starting to Pace with Use of Traditional Materials:

Over 80% of educators cite that over half or more of their curricular resources used in the classroom comes from online sources. +92% say they'd adopt a coherent, sequenced online curriculum equally with that of their regular curriculum if given the option.

Teachers Regularly Turn to the Internet for Curriculum

+79% search for online curricular resources several times a week or more for their classrooms.

Teachers Are Looking for A Variety of Curricular Resources and Like to Use Search Terms:

From worksheets to assessments to lesson plans to primary sources to media, teachers are looking for everything, but use open search terms far more than standards, frameworks, or topic lists.






Chart 3: Grade levels taught

Which of the following grades do you primarily teach?





Chart 4: Subjects Taught






Chart 3: Teachers learning new applications






Chart 5: Guide for Students Using Internet






Chart 7: Technology to differentiate instruction







Chart 8: Sharing common strategies




I have begun to accentuate much of my "on site" traditional materials with more content and curriculum resources l've found online.






Chart 3c: Online sources or digital material

Much of my content and curricular resources are sourced from online sites and systems. While I still use traditional materials when they fit my need, they are often blended with digital resources as part of my daily instruction.







Chart 3e: Readily adopt digital materials

How often do you search online for curriculum resources?






Chart 2: Digital curriculum types

What types of digital resources do you typically search for?







Chart 3: Digital curriculum types
