The theoretical framework should not merely describe theory, but critically engage with it to justify its suitability for answering the research questions.

RESEARCH METHOD

This section explains in detail how the research was conducted. It should clearly describe the methodological approach (qualitative, quantitative, or mixed methods) and justify its selection.

Key elements to be included are:

1. Research design and approach.
2. Research location, subjects, or objects of study.
3. Data sources (primary and/or secondary data).
4. Data collection techniques and research instruments.
5. Data analysis techniques, including coding, statistical analysis, or interpretative methods.

This section must ensure transparency, rigor, and replicability of the research process.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

This section presents and analyzes the empirical findings of the research. The Results subsection focuses on the systematic presentation of data, while the Discussion subsection interprets these findings in relation to the theoretical framework.

The discussion should:

1. Explain the significance of the findings.

3. Highlight new insights, patterns, or implications emerging from the data.

Tables and figures may be used to support data presentation, but they must be clearly explained and integrated into the analysis.

CONCLUSION

(Maximum 200 words, 1–2 paragraphs)

The conclusion summarizes the main findings and answers the research questions. It should emphasize the theoretical and practical contributions of the study. If written in two paragraphs, the second paragraph may include research implications, limitations, and recommendations for future studies. The conclusion must not introduce new data or analysis.

This section acknowledges funding bodies, institutions, or individuals who contributed significantly to the research.
