I want these doors of opportunity to stay open for my little cousins too, who moved from surrounding towns just to have access to District 47's EC program. I want to see these programs and classrooms, and the students in them, fully supported by the leaders put in place to do just that. I wonder what will happen in a few years to enrollment numbers in the rigorous musical groups and high school courses I am taking if resources for advanced learning and enrichment are reduced in elementary school? Will my younger siblings and cousins not have access to them like I have? Are doors already starting to close for them?

There may not be loads of us gifted kids to consider, but we deserve your consideration and to have our special needs met, too. EC encourages us to think outside the box and ask deeper questions. Music teaches us to work together, to be part of a whole that is greater than the sum of its parts. So I challenge everyone to embrace these teachings and pave a path forward that avoids reducing the already minimal early academic and enrichment support that sustains students like me and my peers. Students like my younger siblings and my cousins. And gets D47 back on track to truly and honestly empowering all students to learn and lead.
