

Patrick Nehring is the community development educator/professor in Brown County. Patrick provides instruction, facilitation, and research to nonprofit organizations, local governments, businesses, and individuals on water issues, municipal comprehensive planning, local economic development, food systems, leadership development, and organizational operation.

Ariga Grigoryan is a Community, Natural Resources and Economic Development Educator in Sawyer County and Lac Courte Oreilles (LCO) Tribe. I focus on various community needs including Food Sovereignty, Leadership and Organizational Development with integration of LCO Tribal cultural elements in my work. Prior to this position, Ariga worked internationally on sustainable community development projects in regions of Eurasia and South Caucasus. Her work incorporated agricultural research for development (ARD) through reviving old ties in post-soviet countries and their new transitions. Ariga has also worked with Indigenous Tribes in Central America focusing on small scale agricultural production and nutrition research programs.

Kayla Rombalski is the Community Development Educator for Wood County. Her work is focused on advancing Wood County's economic development strategy. She facilitates community-based solutions around impact areas such as housing, entrepreneurship, broadband and childcare.
