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Would you like to be begrudging? Because I could tell you what temperature it is outside here right now.

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Oh, sure, why not? Begrudge away. Bone!

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You only know the value of what you have when someone else envies it.

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Yes, and now I am begrudging. But, uh...

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Well, I hope... I'm helping you there.

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Yep, nope, it does feel better knowing that, uh... But someone else wants it.

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She's not even pretending, but she's like, yes, it does. The warm fuzzies are real!

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It's okay, I...

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Put it out for... for real. If I can teleport you here, I would.

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As you've said, and I continue to... Mostly believe you.

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Um, but no, I'm having a very good day, I... I am currently in my living room, so it sounds a little bit differently and different than usual.

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I am watching a, uh... Baseball game on mute, already recording, as we were pre-show planning.

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You didn't say, if you hear a cheer midway through, or a groan midway through.

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You'll know, but uh... Hopefully, we'll stay on task.

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I've just been, you know, trying to contemplate what I could be multitasking with while recording a podcast, because, you know, I can't exactly have something on mute that I'm watching.

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Um, but, like... I don't know if there's, like, a live transcript of something that I could be reading on my braille display.

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See, for that, you have cat, though. That's...

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Oh, that's true. My cat is a live entertainment, uh... all on her own every single day. That is true.

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Indeed. So... We have... Started this show with, in my brain, a little bit more, like, losey-goosey, uh...

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Goofy banner, not that we don't often start with goofy banter, but... It's, uh, it's, for me, a little bit more pointed today, because we have a...

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Uh... We have been doozy of a topic today.

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Uh...

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Yeah, this is... this is another one of the heavy ones, guys. We wish we didn't have to do them, but... We feel it's important to talk about.

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And I will... I'll just come right out and say, we are... We are going to discuss, uh...

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The, uh, situation in Washington, D.C. With, uh... Another scenario where Trump and his federalized banana.

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National Guard, and we're gonna... We... it was, like, mainly on the poverty and the disability implications of that, but also talking about it more broadly.

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So, if that's true, it feds. Triggering for you, or more intense than your...

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Wanting to get into right now? This is one to skip. We love you, we'll...

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Totally. Absolutely.

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We'll see you next time. Um... Well, we... we do feel it. It's, um...

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Uh, immense importance to be on the... the radar of folks with disabilities, so...

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Here we are to do that!

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Yes, so you've probably heard about this situation on the news, it's kind of everywhere, um, but the summary of the situation is that President Trump has taken control of Washington, D.C.'s police force, uh, which he can for a limited amount of time as president, and called in.

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The National Guard, um, in response to, uh, a couple of things, um.

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He has... he and his supporters have stated that it is a response to, uh, a crime emergency in DC, which we'll get into.

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That, in a moment, um, but, uh, he says he's responding to increased levels of crime and trying to make the city safer. Um, and it is also, uh, very explicitly.

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A response to, uh, homelessness in DC. One of the stated goals of this increased police and military presence is to clear out homeless encampments, uh, and to get unhoused people off the streets.

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And it is deeply unclear. Where they're supposed to go.

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Um, and so there... there are a number of things, uh, that we're concerned about here.

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But I think maybe, Justin, do we want to start with the crime issue?

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Yes, unless, uh... Let's look at the, uh...

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Crime issue from a, uh, a... statistical standpoint, um...

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And if you... What a real detailed breakdown of this.

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Um, NPR did a... a... show on this, I think.

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Three days ago now? Uh, where they looked at...

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Each of the metrics. That, uh...

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3 or 4 metrics that Trump was using, um... I'll mention 3 specifically. The murder rates...

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The carjacking and burglary rates... And the, uh, violent crime rates?

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Mm-hmm.

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That he has pointed to. Specifically for the...

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This... Uh, crime emergency?

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Mm-hmm.

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Uh... being activated, and if you look at, like, all three of his... Well, there are more, but the three that I indicated here.

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Each and every one of those stats! Is either at a 10-year low.

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Mm-hmm.

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A 5-year low, or a 30-year low? So, uh, and... and it doesn't get...

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The data doesn't improve. For Trump and his allies, and the other.

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Two or three notable categories, it's all. Down across the board.

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Mm-hmm.

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Um... And it should be stated... In fairness...

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That even people in... long-time resident in DC.

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Will tell you that crime... can be an issue.

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Mm-hmm.

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From time to time. However... those residents.

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Will also tell you, because I've seen it on the news, and I've... spoken to folks familiar with living in DC.

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Well, I'll tell you that the prime... has been dropping.

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For at least 2-3 years. So, there's no... there's no merit base.

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Mm-hmm.

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For this at all.

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Totally, and in addition to that, you know, something we were talking about, uh, again, in our pre-show planning, is.

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Let's say for a minute there was a serious crime spike happening right now, that, you know, either crime had suddenly gotten a lot worse, or had been increasing over the past two to three years.

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A... infusion of escalated police presence and military presence. Could bring that down temporarily. It is bringing crime down temporarily.

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Um, but... It is not a long-term solution. If people could just be.

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Frightened out of doing crimes, they're... the world would work a lot differently than it does. In reality, a lot of what leads to crime is poverty and is lack of social supports, and, you know.

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The things that we see that actually improve crime rates are, uh.

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Improved social safety nets, and uh... better access to needed services in neighborhoods, and more closely-knit neighborhoods, where people take care of one another.

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And I... I would imagine, I don't have the data to show this, but I would imagine it's those kinds of initiatives that have been causing crime to fall.

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Over the past few years in DC. But whatever they're doing is working.

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Yeah.

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And so... and doing this. Is not going to, in the long term.

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Help, even if that was actually what. It was meant to do, which I would argue it is not. It is the justification, not the reason.

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Yes, and we'll go back, um... into the impure politics beat in particular.

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In place the link. To that show... Um, within the show notes.

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For this episode. Uh, but I do remember...

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And I heard this on that show, and I heard similar things in other... So, uh, spaces...

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Two, uh... even folks... familiar with the activation of the National Guard. In this case.

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In NPR's case, two retired, uh... a National Guard generals...

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Have said, this is. Performative?

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Mm-hmm.

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Uh, things that they're doing, like, nighttime patrols. In the tourist areas.

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Daytime patrols in the tourist areas. Nighttime patrols down Georgetown streets.

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Even the people within the system. Or that were recently in the system.

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Meaning the guard... Say this is performative.

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Mm-hmm.

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Is there... it's not really... If there is a... whatever stated purpose there is.

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Even by the barest metrics. Is not being fulfilled.

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Yeah, absolutely, and I... you know, and that's also borne out over... there are... several times in the history of the United States where the National Guard has been called into a city where there's been military presence in a city, and, you know, you could definitely look at any number of those examples and argue about whether or not it was justified there.

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But virtually everyone who's examining this, who's, you know, part of the National Guard, or is a historian, or has some familiarity with what this usually looks like.

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Agrees, this is not normal. This... this does not meet the standards by which the National Guard is usually called in. Um... And... and it's performative.

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Absolutely. Um... Becca, do we want to...

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Move now, uh... to reasons why...

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This is concerning to us, particularly from a disability and health perspective.

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Yeah, I... because I... I think for all that it... it... this is performative, it also definitely has... very concrete goals in that, uh, some of which are about.

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Performativity, and some of which are not, and... and one of those is definitely, um... this approach to, uh, homelessness. Um, that, uh.

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Trump has made it clear that, uh, he does not believe in housing first, that he wants to see unhoused people off the streets, and.

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Sent wherever is basically the, you know, treatment centers, hospitals, or just.

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Not here. Um... And this is...

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Deeply concerning to... to us from a disability perspective, and just from.

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A humanitarian perspective, um... Because people... for one thing, uh, people who are unhoused.

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Are disproportionately likely to have disabilities, especially mental health disabilities. Um, so we're talking about, uh, people with frequently a lot of trauma, people, uh, experiencing, uh, different states of consciousness and different perspectives on reality.

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We're also talking about people with a wide variety of disabilities and medical needs.

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And... very few... like, none of them looked at their life and went.

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Gosh, the best place for me to be... the place that I would most like to be of anywhere that I could possibly be.

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Is sleeping in this homeless encampment on the street. You know, this...

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There is a reason why Housing First has been the... the top model for ending homelessness in.

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For... for quite some time, and it's because... people have a really hard time getting.

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Healthcare and mental health treatment or addiction treatment, or any other kinds of services that would... help improve their lives.

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Exactly.

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If they also don't have a stable place to live. And nothing about this approach is going to give people a stable place to live. It is simply evicting them.

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From where they are. And potentially placing them in treatments or institutions against their will.

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And this... this is something that we have, uh, you know, that... we have tried to stop doing as a society, by and large, is institutionalizing disabled people.

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And it is deeply concerning to see that resurfacing.

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Yeah. Um, and I think, for me. Um, like, I watched.

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The majority of the initial. Roll out.

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And when we say... that the, um...

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This is a pattern of the Trump administration. Is... this is what I mean. Like, when they talked about...

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Um... reducing the Medicaid rolls and the, um... the federal support program roles.

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And said, oh, we're gonna do it with a, uh... a scalpel and not a sword, or a hatchet.

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Mm-hmm.

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Um, that has been... Free uniformly proven to be...

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Yeah.

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A lie? I mean, at the most charitable reading rose over...

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Say, man. Um... And, uh, Trump, very early on in the press conference, says.

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We're gonna rehouse them, we're gonna... It's gonna be great. They're gonna go to better places.

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And then, when anyone tried to follow up on that, the answer has been pretty uniformly again.

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Mm-hmm.

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We don't know. We have no real plan. For the... there's... there's literally...

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No... place for them to go.

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Nor... nor does there seem to be... mud and head.

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Yeah.

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To arrive at a place for them to go. Which I find deeply concerning.

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Yeah, no, it's... it's very much a... just criminalizing the presence of.

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People sleeping on the streets, and, you know, and that... it leads to criminalizing mental illness, criminalizing disability.

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Um, and what's, you know, let's not forget, like. This justification of crime that they have for.

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For all of this, you know, that's... that's related to... uh, you know, considering being homeless a crime, basically. Um, and it's also got significant.

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Uh, racist... undertones, overtones, both. Um...

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Yeah.

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That, you know, when just about any politician. Is... is talking up... is using crime as a major talking point.

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This is code for... we want to suppress the activities of black and brown people in this area.

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We... we want to arrest people, we... we want to just make life.

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Yeah.

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Harder for Black and Brown people. And so... I'm... I am worried about all of these... the unhoused folks who are getting swept up in this, but I... I am particularly worried about.

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Black and brown folks who are also unhoused.

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Yeah, and... If you want the raw data on this, um...

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You can find it. Um... Because in the last...

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Several months since... Um... Trump took office a second time around.

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The efforts to basically... got the mental, uh, well, uh, health and, um...

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Wellness System? Have been... not...

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Mm-hmm.

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Well, they've been pretty... Uh, demonstrably out in the open?

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Um, so then... to then use...

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Uh, mental health journeys... As a reason for removing.

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Homeless? Folks, uh, while you're gutting the systems in which they could receive...

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Neighborhood and community-based, uh... services is transparently...

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Evil, honestly.

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Yeah. So, that's... right now, uh, what we know about what's going on in DC, we know that some amount of this, uh, clearing out of encampments is happening.

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Um, other than that, there's ... there's a lot of just... military making a show of being present, like Justin said, the...

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You know, nighttime and daytime patrols of tourists, uh, areas. So, you know, there...

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There is more that one could. Imagine this... this situation.

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Turning into, uh, that is not manifesting yet. But the message is very clear, is, you know, that...

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We are here in force, and... if anyone steps out of line by being.

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Too poor, too disabled. In public to... to Brown.

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Uh, there will be consequences. And this threat is not just aimed at the residents of Washington, D.C.

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Um, one of... another part of this that, uh, concerns me.

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Very strongly, is that Trump has explicitly said that this is a blueprint for what he would like to do in other cities in the United States. You want to say a bit more about that, Justin?

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Yes, I think, um... the two that I have heard...

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The most tedra about, let's take... Let, um... Getting our way back machines for...

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For a minute... Or in this case, I guess, a medium back machine.

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Uh, because we know what he's done. Or what the Trump administration, excuse me, has done in LA.

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Um... And we know... To be frank, most of those troops by now have been...

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Deactivated, because they got there and there was... So I'm like, let's drill in a park, and then...

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Whoops. Uh, there's absolutely, literally nothing for us to do here, so...

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Uh, they were fairly quickly deactivated as not to be embarrassing.

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Mm-hmm.

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Uh, and ooh, surprise, they still were. Uh, and I should say, as a...

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Yep.

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As a family... with the history of military service?

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In my family. This is no...

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Offense intended. To the guards!

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People, or guardsmen and guardswomen. They're doing a job. They were told to go somewhere, and they go.

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Mm-hmm.

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This is what they do. Uh, it's... I have an issue with the people pulling their strings.

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Yeah.

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Yeah.

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But nonetheless... Uh, most of the time around LA has been deactivated, because there was...

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Nothing for them to do. But... Um, then you get the, uh...

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Justification around DC. And there is now...

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Most of the chatter I'm hearing is that they want to target.

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Uh, specifically New York and Chicago? Next, with some...

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Mm-hmm.

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I thought of targeting Louisiana, uh, New Orleans as well, but mostly... New York and Chicago?

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Uh, and what's most... Well, there are many, many alarming things about all of this, but...

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I think there are two... fundamentally alarming things, and...

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Frankly, too fundamentally authoritarian things about this. Is... all of the cities that are being considered for targets.

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Are blue cities? Meaning they're run by Democratic administrations?

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Mm-hmm.

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And most of them, if not all of them, I'm not gonna... State all of them, because frankly, I don't...

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No, for sure. But I know the majority of them, at the very least, are...

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Uh, run by... Uh, mayors and administrations that are heavily.

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Either Black or people of color of all stripes. So, just some really distressing...

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Yeah.

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Unhoused people are publicly part of your community, you know, if there is a... a place where people stay close by, or if people are, uh, you know, asking for funds on the street.

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Say hi to them. Connect with them. Get to know, because they're... they are part of your community. They are part of our community.

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And in terms of coping, I mean, I would say that connecting is also a form of coping, but, you know, if you can't.

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Stand to... to read or talk about this anymore. You know, just reach out to someone and say, like, you know, can we go play a game?
