3	<p>Learning outcomes (PLO + CLO)</p> <p>Course Description</p> <p>a. The course introduces some basic approaches to the study of meaning in linguistics and related fields. The primary focus will be on word meaning (lexical semantics), but the course will also observe approaches to sentence meaning, cognitive semantics, and focus on the lexicon.</p> <p>b. Pragmatics is the branch of linguistics that studies how people communicate and understand each other. This course introduces students to the study of contextualized meaning in linguistics and attempt to answer the question: how do we create meaning from the utterances we make.</p> <p>Program Learning Outcomes:</p> <p>A1. Group Presentation Students are assigned to read one chapter related to a certain topic on semantics collaboratively summarize it, and collaboratively present it in class discussions. The quality of the summary and their presentation will be the points of the assessment. 3. Individual Presentation Students are individually assigned to read one chapter related to a certain topic on pragmatics and present it in class discussions. The quality of the summary and their presentation will be the points of the assessment 4. Final Project Final project is an essay containing either semantic or pragmatic issues or the combination of both issues that they have to hand in at the end of the semester.
