Important Concepts for the Lesson (InTASC 4; InTASC 7)

- The students will need to understand that they will have some prior knowledge on these subjects of grammar, but they may be stored long ago and they may not remember. The students need to understand that this is a pretest to test their knowledge, they will not have it mastered.
- Understanding prepositional phrases.
- Developing prepositional phrases.
- Recognizing prepositional phrases within a sentence.
- Understanding what a participle is and how to identify them in a sentence.
- Identifying and understanding participial phrases in a sentence.
- Recognizing and understanding how to identify a gerund within a sentence.
- Understanding and identifying gerund phrases within a sentence.

- Understanding what infinitives, infinitive phrases, appositives, and appositive phrases are and how to identify them in a sentence.
- Identifying and understanding infinitive and appositive phrases within a sentence.
- Recognizing and understanding how to identify an infinitive or appositive within a sentence.

Higher Order Thinking Skills (Revised Bloom's)

<u>Remembering:</u> Recalling prior knowledge of prepositional phrases, adjective phrases, adverb phrases, participles, participial phrases, gerunds, gerund phrases, infinitives, infinitive phrases, appositives, and appositive phrases.

<u>Understanding:</u> Understanding that this is a pretest, they will not have these skills mastered. <u>Applying:</u> Applying prior knowledge in order to complete the pretest.

<u>Analyzing:</u> Analyzing sentence structure to establish a relationship between the different aspects of grammar found in module 3.

Creating: Creating foundational knowledge of these aspects of grammar.

Essential Prior Knowledge for New Learning (InTASC 4; InTASC 7)

The understanding of proper English grammar.

The understanding of prepositional phrases, adjective phrases, adverb phrases, participles, participal phrases, gerunds, gerund phrases, infinitives, infinitive phrases, appositives, and appositive phrases.

Flexible and Responsive Instruction (InTASC 1; InTASC 2; InTASC 7)

Special Needs:

1. Students with special needs will be sent to the resource room to take their tests with necessary accommodations. (audio, reading, silent, etc.)

Advanced Students: Students who master this content or show essential understanding will "test out" these grammar aspects individually. Need to pass with a 75% or better.

Instructional Procedures (InTASC 4; InTASC 5; InTASC 6; InTASC 7; InTASC 8)

Review: Students will not need to review anything of this lesson since we are testing their knowledge.

Anticipatory Set: My class will begin the day by viewing their agenda slide, and reading the learning target. We then will discuss what is expected of them for the pretest. As stated above, they need to understand we are testing their knowledge, and that they will not have this mastered.

- To begin the lesson I will read the agenda board to the students including the learning target. From here I will establish that the pretest is a test of their prior knowledge. The skills seen on the grammar test will not be mastered, and are not expected to be. The test will not affect their grades and will not be in the grade book. I will then reiterate that the students have the opportunity to test out with a 75% or better.	- Once we have a classroom discussion about the pretest, I will then pass out the test itself and the students will begin working. I will also explain that if they do not understand a question to raise their hand and I will walk around and help them.	- The pretest will take the students the entire duration of the hour, but if they are to finish early they will need to turn to page 41 of their grammar book to review the definition of a preposition. They will then need to turn to page 43 to read the definition of prepositional phrases. They will then begin working through these exercises.
