GENERAL DESCRIPTION

*Our Spanish language curriculum is centered around **vivencias**, or the lived experience of working-class Black and Indigenous peoples on our continent. Cultural and political topics are curated to the expertise and experience of each instructor. All our courses focus on teaching inclusive, gender-neutral, and anti-racist language. There is an emphasis on validating U.S. Spanish and other varieties of Spanish often considered "non-standard." We actively include "vos" as used in Central America.*

Important: All courses are available to BIPOC participants. Classes marked with *Open to All are open to participants of any background. Classes marked BIPOC are reserved exclusively for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC).

All class times are listed in Eastern Standard Time (EST). Participants are welcome to join from anywhere, just be sure to adjust for your local time zone.
