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Instructional Model

The Rhode Island Department of Education (RIDE) has approved six instructional models for use. Districts have the prerogative to select a model of instruction that best fits the needs of students and staff. The Portsmouth School Department uses the *Collaborative ESL and General Instruction* model.

MLL vs. EL vs. ESL

Over the years, the terms used to define and describe language learning students and programs have evolved. These updates have been disputed by some because of confusing acronyms. Here are a few of the common acronyms you may see in literature:

- ✓ MLL = multilingual learner (term currently used in Rhode Island)
- ✓ EL = English learner (former term used in Rhode Island)
- ✓ ELL = English language learner (term currently used in Massachusetts)
- ✓ ESL = English as a second language (still found in many state and federal documents)
- ✓ L1 = the first language a student acquired
- ✓ L2 = the second language a student acquired (usually English)

Translators and Interpreters

If a family has requested that school communication take place in another language, then we are required to accommodate this request. This does not necessarily mean that the student is learning English. It is only used as an alert to let you know the language preference of the parents or guardians. Many of our English-speaking students have family members who need language support.

Formal & Legal documents

All interpreter and translation requests need to be made through your school's administrator or designee. These requests are then forwarded to Student the Office of Services (683-1039, ext 1016). All legal documents and correspondence associated with IEPs, 504s, and discipline are required to be professionally translated whenever possible.

Informal & Social documents

Brief email messages to parents can be sent out using **Google Translate** or **Microsoft Translator**. The more concise the message, the higher the probability that your intent will translate properly. Always include an English version with your translated message. Parents often share school messages with other English-speaking family members.

The WIDA Consortium

The World-Class Instructional Design and Assessment (WIDA) organization is the professional consortium that RIDE belongs to. There are 41 states in the consortium. WIDA provides professional development, student learning, and assessment standards that promote high achievement and academic success in the areas of reading, writing, listening, and speaking. The five WIDA standards are: Social & Instructional language, the language of Language Arts, the language of Mathematics, the language of Science, and the language of Social Studies.

WIDA Access Testing

The WIDA Access test is the required annual standardized test that every MLL student participates in. Students are tested in their English language development in reading, writing, listening and speaking. Test scores are used to determine program eligibility and direction of instruction. The administration window is early January to mid-February. Results will be available for parent and teacher review in May.

WIDA Screener

The WIDA Screener is the tool that is used to determine if a student is in need of language development services. The areas of reading, writing, listening, and speaking are assessed and a composite score determines eligibility.

This workshop explores ways to use the WIDA ELD Standards Framework, 2020 Edition to support multilingual learners' achievement and language development.
