	Video Concept Summary
Working Video Title:	Women Who Changed History: Catherine the Great
Audience:	Undergraduate students in a World History course focusing on 18th-century European women in power.
Purpose:	This video helps students discover how Catherine the Great carved out power and influence in a world dominated by men, highlighting her leadership, reforms, and cultural contributions.
Main Message:	Catherine's story shows how vision and smart strategy can break barriers and reshape an entire empire's future.
Video Length:	4 minutes and 45 seconds
Video Modality	Animated explainer video

	Video Design Rationale
Audience & Purpose	This video was created for college-level World History students. Learning Goals: 1. Discover key turning points in Catherine's rise to power. 2. Analyze her leadership through Enlightenment ideals. 3. Reflect on her impact as a transformative historical figure.
Structure & Sequencing:	To keep students engaged, I have broken the video into seven clear sections. Starting with a curiosity-driven hook, each scene builds on the last, reflecting Catherine's journey from outsider to Empress. This structure supports Mayer's segmenting principle by allowing learners to process each part without overload (Fiorella & Mayer, 2018, p. 466). The sequence includes: 1. Opening Hook Curiosity-based historical question 2. Humble Beginnings Childhood and early challenges 3. Marriage into the Russian Court Power dynamics and adaptation 4. Strategy and Struggles Learning, building influence 5. The Coup Turning point of power acquisition 6. Leadership & Legacy Reforms, achievements

7. Closing Reflection Leadership summary and emotional takeaway
The narrator guides viewers with a warm, curious tone, one that evolves with the story's
emotion, from intrigue to tension to triumph. This mirrors Brames' (2016) findings that
conversational tone boosts engagement. Music shifts throughout: regal orchestral
themes elevate scenes of power, while soft classical piano evokes introspective
moments. These audio cues reinforce mood and signal transitions (Fyfield et al., 2022, p.
155).
Viewers see portraits, maps, and timelines that visually anchor the story. A palette of
regal golds, reds, and blues keeps things visually cohesive without overwhelming the
viewer. These elements reflect the signaling principle, helping direct learner attention to
what matters most (Fyfield et al., 2022, p.155; Mayer, 2005).
To hold learner attention, each scene starts with a curiosity question and uses precise
pacing to avoid information overload. Visuals and narration are closely timed to help
students connect ideas more easily. I ensured that the storytelling format was a contrast
between "what was vs. what could be" to keep the viewer emotionally invested (Duarte,
2010).
Curiosity: Each scene opens with a question that sparks interest (Fiorella & Marra 2019)
Mayer, 2018).
Pacing: Intentional pauses and scene breaks prevent overload (Brame, 2016).
Narration and Visual Sync: Dual coding is reinforced through synced voiceover
and visuals (Brame, 2016).

	Reinforcement: Catherine's traits, resilience, strategy, and vision are revisited throughout.
	This video also draws from successful YouTube storytelling strategies:
YouTube Insights:	 Structure: A modern archbook, rising action, and resolution keep viewers engaged (Video Creators, 2023). Curiosity: Scene transitions pose intriguing questions, supporting segmentation and engagement (Fiorella & Mayer, 2018; Fyfield et al., 2022). Tone: Narration varies in tone and rhythm to hold interest (Primal Video, 2022). Audio-Visual Sync: Maps and portraits align with narration to apply the modality principle (Brame, 2016).
