MLA General Guidelines

- ★ Double space body of writing.
- ★ Insert a header that includes your last name and page number in the upper-right corner.
- ★ Include a heading in the upper left hand corner that includes your name, teacher's name, period, and date on separate lines.
- ★ Use Arial, Times Roman or Calibri font for the text.
- ★ Final copy must be 12 pt font in black.
- ★ Title must be centered and no greater than 18 pt font.
- ★ Add one space after periods or other punctuation marks.
- ★ 1" margins on all sides.
- ★ Indent the first line of a paragraph using the TAB button or 5 space bars. Be consistent with your style.
- ★ Use italics throughout your essay for the titles of longer works.
- ★ Include a Works Cited page.

Attach punctuation (period, exclamation point, question mark, colon, etc) to the previous word.

Mundy, Ms. Mecomber, and Mrs. Scott.

Capitalize the names of people and places.

Add a space after punctuation (comma, period, exclamation point, question mark, colon, etc).

Introduce the source that you will cite with a sentence starter.

At the end of the quote, attach an end quotation to the last word and add a space before parenthesis, page number where the information was found, end parenthesis and period.
