Stage 1: Desired Results General Information Essential Question(s) In this unit, students learn about the political, economic, How and why does public policy have the potential and social divisions of events pre-Civil War and during to negatively impact its people? The Civil War. At what point should people fight to defend deeply held political and social beliefs? How can individuals and groups affect social change? How does war impact and change society?
