- Africa is rising, but is the Open Movement Rising with It?
- Olden technology days: logging in from cybercafes. Cell phones available, but weak.
- 2011 only South Africa had a Wikimedia affiliate
- 2019 12 Wikimedia affiliates
- 105 million Nigerians online 2018 (60% of country) but participation in open movements online lags behind
- One country in Europe has more edits than entire continent of 54 African nations unacceptable
- How to solve the participation gap?
- Basic questions:
 - o Do they know Wikipedia even exists?
 - Wikimedia awareness was 27% AMONG INTERNET USERS (US-87%; France-84%)
 - O How to solve the awareness problem?
 - Comedy ads
- Awareness after two commercials went up to 48% -- this is a major jump!
- Get conversations going about the projects that exist
 - Must be local and based on local models
 - Month-long Twitter campaign
 - Word of mouth increases

- Bring people into the community by offering them to join projects that interest them
- Wiki Loves Africa five years now
- AfroCine project (Wikipedia-based)
- Awareness is the key!
- Awareness precedes participation
