SUPERMAN READING ORDER: CITY OF TOMORROW ERA (JEPH LOEB/JOE KELLY; 1999-2005)



Guide by Rize

This reading guide covers the era of Superman comics that was written primarily by Jeph Loeb and Joe Kelly, with significant contributions from Joe Casey, Mark Schultz, and a few others. The run is very distinct in that it rebuilt Metropolis as a true futuristic city of tomorrow, revamped the tone to feel optimistic and fun, put Superman into the heart of modern day political issues, and populated Clark's supporting cast and rogues gallery with plenty of new faces. It's an underrated run that is inconsistently collected due to the complicated nature of the reading order, and the sheer size of the run as a whole. Not ALL stories are written by Loeb/Kelly, but all stories are working within Loeb/Kelly's editorial framework.

Since there are several concurrent Superman series that weave together to form one story, the previous era (primarily by Dan Jurgens) used "triangle" numbers to tell the reader the order to read the issues in. Unlike that era however, the triangle numbers no longer indicate chronological reading order. So why have them at all? Because fuck you, that's why. (Actually, they dropped the triangle numbers altogether in 2002). Not only that, but the books didn't even follow any set pattern of chronology, which is to say, you can't always simply alternate between the four main books to get the right order. It's absolute chaos. **Even some official trades have some of these stories printed out of order!** Reading everything in the right order is very difficult. Hence, the existence of this guide. So as long as you follow this, you won't need to worry about any of that. Just enjoy the comics!

Prerequisite Reading:

None is required, as this run is fairly self-contained, and pretty good about getting you up to speed when it isn't. However, if you are very unfamiliar with Superman and his history, you may want to read about his origin ("Superman: Birthright" by Waid or "Man of Steel" by Byrne), as well as the Death & Return saga by Jurgens ("Death of Superman", "Funeral for a Friend", "Reign of the Supermen", "Return of Superman").

What this guide does NOT include:

- **Filler issues.** These issues are excluded for both quality reasons and for being irrelevant to the run as a whole. This even includes a few issues by Loeb/Kelly themselves, but I tried to avoid that. I know it sounds paradoxical, but trust me, by removing certain issues, the story is MORE complete, and certainly more enjoyable. I only consider it filler if it is both irrelevant AND bad. If an irrelevant issue is particularly good, or a bad issue is important, I will not consider it filler and include it.
- Stories from other Superman eras. This means anything from the previous era (Dan Jurgens era) or the following era (Infinite Crisis era). There are other guides you can find for both of those eras that will serve you very well.

- Supergirl (1996). I highly recommend reading Peter David's Supergirl, but there's no way to easily weave it into the main Superman narrative without harming the stories of BOTH series. David's Supergirl started several years before this era began, making it a kind of relic of the Jurgens era, and it remained very independent of the other Super-books. She is consistently sidelined in this era, and is actually eventually replaced with a brand new Supergirl (or two) towards the end, who IS integrated into the main line. So, definitely check out David's Supergirl (here's my guide: Supergirl Reading Order: "Fallen Angel" Era), but don't try to read it concurrently with this Superman era. If you're gonna read both, then read the entirety of David's Supergirl before City of Tomorrow, and try to ignore any tiny "spoilers" you might come across in the later issues (there aren't any big ones).
- **Most issues of Superboy (1993).** This series is another relic of the Jurgens era. For the most part, it's just not worth reading, and it has no relevance to the main Superman books except where noted. Joe Kelly did have a short stint on Superboy, some issues of which are included.
- Most issues of Supergirl (2005). Only the initial Jeph Loeb run of this series is included for both quality and relevance purposes. The rest of the series is complicated by Infinite Crisis and other shenanigans, and is sadly not really worth reading. The Joe Kelly issues are admittedly fun though, so you can check those out if you want, but don't expect a satisfying ending.
- Other minor Superman appearances/spinoffs. This means many appearances of Superman in JLA and other books of the time that have nothing to do with this story, as well as very tangential spinoffs like "Doomsday Wars" or "Metropolis".

I am a completionist, so I like seeing as much as possible, but only if it doesn't actively harm the story as a whole. So if I exclude something, please be assured that it was for a good reason. THE GUIDE

The guide is divided into story arcs. There are several stretches where the issues become more standalone. These sections are noted, and formatted as if they were story arcs. Do not disregard these issues, as they are still important to the overall narrative and subplots. The following abbreviations will be used:

AOS = Adventures of Superman

MOS = Superman: The Man of Steel

AC = Action Comics

Superman for All Seasons

Note: This was Loeb's first Superman story. Unlike the rest of the run, this takes place in the early days of Superman's career. Despite that, there are some themes introduced here that continue to recur throughout. It is technically optional, but it's quite good so I recommend it.

Note: This is where the reading order gets nasty. This arc is notoriously complicated for having several interconnected stories going on at the same time that could not possibly be happening at the same time. The writers began to completely disregard the triangle numbers. J.M. DeMatteis's AOS issues, a storyline about Lord Satanus, are particularly problematic, as they have almost nothing to do with the President Luthor story, yet directly reference it a few times in ways which simply aren't possible. Not only that, but the magical and apocalyptic nature of the story is completely at odds with the tone and themes of the President Luthor story. But the silver lining is that the Satanus story is not very good, meaning there's actually no reason to force it in (DeMatteis didn't even finish writing it, so why should we read it?). Because of this, I have chosen to remove the unnecessary issues. However, there are a few pages in a couple of said issues which are nice additions to the Luthor story if you want, and they have been marked. Said pages are not 100% necessary though.

Note: Luthor Secret Files contains entirely flashbacks, but do not make the mistake of reading it first. It will spoil some reveals and kill the drama. It is meant to be read after the Lex 2000 one-shot.
