Each time someone watches a new show or video, plays a new game or downloads a new app, have that person write a review. Family members can then check the log to help them decide how to schedule their viewing time.

Share strategies for friendly conversations

One critical part of making friends, at school or anywhere, is knowing how to start a conversation and keep one going. Teach your teen conversation openers such as "I really like your..." or "Do you know what I learned (saw, did) today?" Then your teen can add to a conversation by asking open-ended questions like "What do you think of...?" or "How come...?" Making eye contact and staying calm shows interest and will put others at ease.

Don't let your teen trade personal goals for popularity

By the time they're teens, many kids think they have to be good looking or popular to be happy. They may suppress their own needs, wants, and talents, and stop pursuing their own goals. Discuss the ways real life differs from stereotypes in popular media. Help your teen develop a strong sense of

personal identity by introducing a variety of activities and experiences and providing unconditional love.

Show the support that helps teens stay in school

To be ready for college or a career, your teen must stay in school. To encourage him, talk frequently about how much you appreciate your own education, or why you wish you'd gotten more. Make sure he has access to study materials at home or at the library, and support his efforts to complete schoolwork. Focus on your teen's strengths, not his weaknesses, and express confidence in his abilities.

Correct spelling makes your teen's writing more effective

Your teen's ideas may be brilliant, but her readers may not think so if her spelling is bad. To help her improve her spelling, play word games like Scrabble. Nurture your teen's love of reading, too. The more she reads, the more correct spelling she'll see. Encourage her to write and to proofread her writing. And make sure she has access to a dictionary.

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
