



## Relationships, Sexual Health & Parenthood Education at Hatton (Cruden) School Refresh



### Parental Feedback and final progression decisions

This academic session, our staff have reviewed a new Health and Well-being resource called RSHP Scotland (website link - [Home - RSHP](#)) and this stands for Relationships, Sexual Health & Parenthood. Mrs Stewart has been using her one day out a week to develop HWB progression plans to update our RSHP curriculum here at Hatton (Cruden) School. As a staff, we felt it was important to also get your views on various aspects of this new resource and below is some feedback from the discussions Mrs Beattie had with a parent working group last week as well as discussions held with staff.

I have included a link to the resource/ powerpoint slide for each topic area. Please have a look at each resource as many of these topic areas are only discussed at a brief level.

Discussion held on the importance of teaching the word vulva as many adults aren't aware of this, however when should this be introduced?  Other sexual organs are taught at second level

How Human Life Begins	<a href="#">Part-1.-How human-life begins-pregnancy-and-birth</a>	First Level (P4)	First Level (P4) Except for slides 31,	It is part 3 of this powerpoint slide which we are unsure should be taught at P4 level (slide 32 in particular). Some feel that it is important to have it in as if you teach parts 1 & 2 then the children will naturally ask about this part, however some felt it would be better to introduce part 3 later and slide 32 is repeated in P7. Mrs

Slides 31, 32 & 33 will be taught in P7.
Breastfeeding	<a href="#">Part-2.-What babies-need.pptx (live.com)</a>	First Level (P4)	First Level (P4) for specific ppt but to speak about it as early as P1	Feedback is that this is a good resource and important to normalise breastfeeding. Would like to focus on the nutrition side and felt that the video wasn't entirely necessary other than helping to normalise breastfeeding. Many parents feel that breastfeeding should be introduced as early as P1.  Decision made in order for it to be normalised to speak about breastfeeding if it comes up from P1 but specific powerpoint in P4. Decision made that the video isn't necessary to show & teachers can source a better video suited for the resource.
Online Safety (pornography slide only)	<a href="#">Part-1.-Where-do we-go-online Slides.pptx (live.com)</a>	Second Level (P6)	Second Level (P6)	As a staff we wanted parents views on Slide 10 only as all other slides were pertinent. Discussions held on how it was just the basic principles of what it is. Found it important for children to understand the points raised in the slides so that they know what to do if it comes on their phone/ ipad (i.e., to inform an adult) Possibly P7, possibly p5, P6 or P7  Decision made to keep at P6 level.

Menstruation goes into more detail in P6.</p> <p>One person in wider parent group said P6 but rest agreed with P5 so we will keep it at this level</p>
Menstruation	<a href="#">Menstruation June-2020.pptx (live.com)</a>	Second Level (P6)	Second Level (P6)	<p>This resource goes into more detail than the one above and as the average age for getting a period is from the ages of 10 – 16 it was felt that this is also at the right level</p> <p>One person in wider parent forum said to do this in P5 however as we are doing My Body is Changing in P5, we will do this one at P6 level</p>
Transgender Discussion	<a href="#">Part-3.-Being transgender Slides.pptx (live.com)</a>	Second Level (P5)	Second Level Term 4 of P6	<p>Some felt that the resource was basic enough to have this at P5 level as it doesn't go into any detail and a discussion was held on what pupils can see on social media in relation to this and that it is important to speak about this in a secure environment such as school. Other felt that P5 was too early and should be shared either in P6 or P7.</p>

				<p>During wider parental consultation a parent noted that it would be good to introduce this either before hormones are raging, it can become more confusing to do it during their rise in hormones. To make kids aware it's ok to be a girl &amp; like boys activities and vice versa. Playing football as a girl doesn't mean you might be transgender.</p> <p>This is the one which held more discussion and many felt that it should be taught later than P5, either late P6 or P7. A few also asked for parental consent on this topic area being taught.</p> <p>As a staff we decided to share this powerpoint in term 4 of P6. It will be very basic and only the information on the powerpoint slide will be shared.</p>

Due to this we will keep it as the recommended stage instead of having it earlier.</p>

Also, discussion held on whether there should be a part in about introducing contraception.</p> <p>Some mentioned having this in P6 to go along with menstruation. We will need to look at the slides between here and the P4 resource (part 3 section of slides) to decide how we teach sex to the pupil.</p> <p>Decision made to keep this at P7 level and share the same slides (31, 32 &amp; 33 from <a href="#">Part-1.-How-human-life-begins-pregnancy-and-birth-Updated-March-2020.pptx</a> (live.com))</p>
