

IDEA398C - Special Topics in Coaching: Carillon Peer Mentors

COURSE DESCRIPTION

IDEA398C: Carillon Peer Mentors is a 2-credit course to support Carillon Community students to meet the goals of the Carillon Studio (IDEA101). Working with the Studio instructor you will apply methods learned in this course (IDEA398C) and your prior experience in Carillon as you develop your skills in communication, leadership, mentorship, and design thinking.

This course requires that you actively engage to best prepare for your role as a peer mentor. Together, with your peers and instructors, we will collaborate to help you achieve the goals you set as a Carillon Peer Mentor.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

After successfully completing this course you will be able to:

- Evaluate different mentoring styles and techniques to support peer learning.
- Apply coaching techniques to help others understand design thinking and teamwork methods.
- Assess the value and applicability of mentorship in your academic, career and personal journey.

IDEA398C will have weekly, synchronous meetings to prepare you to mentor the IDEA101 Carillon students the following week. The weekly flow is as follows:

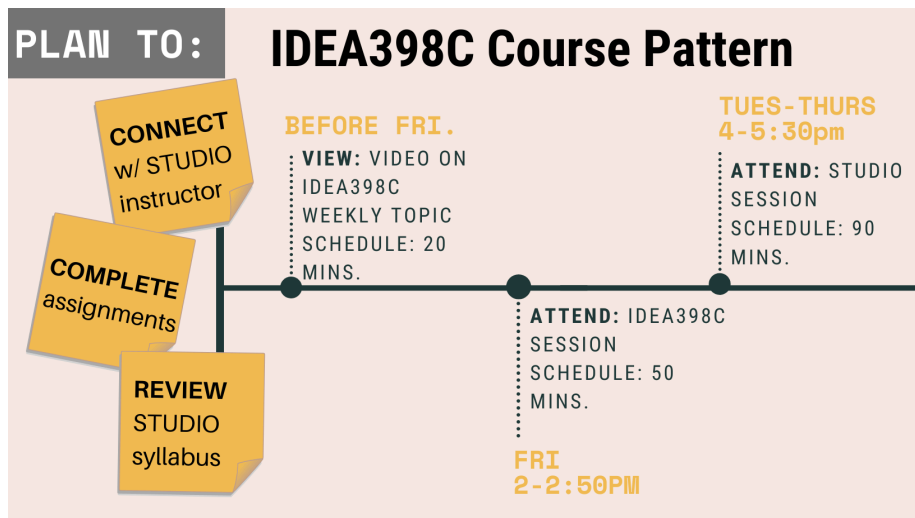

Role of a Carillon Peer Mentor

As a peer mentor your role in the course is crucial to the success of the Carillon Studio. This is achieved through:

- Promoting student engagement and participation in the IDEA101 studio.
- Serving as a resource to students.
- Supporting students as they learn how to work in teams, as they learn design thinking and as they develop their fearless mission statements.
- Assisting in promoting the value of the IDEA101 Carillon Studio assignments and activities.
- Providing personal examples, when possible, from your experience at UMD and in Carillon Communities.
- Modeling successful student behavior (arrive on time; be attentive; energetically and enthusiastically interact with students to maintain an approachable, collegial, and supportive classroom climate; refrain from any behavior that is distracting).

Absence from Carillon Studio and Weekly Meeting, and Missed Due Dates

- If you have any concerns that will impact your participation in class or meeting a due date, let one of us know.
- If you will be absent from either IDEA398C or IDEA101 Studio, notify your course instructor as soon as feasible by sending an email with the subject line: Carillon Your Name Absence From Class.
