Discussion Questions

1. Start up TV nation

Why do you think American television studios look to Israel for inspiration? Do you think there's something inherent to Israelis that enhances their creativity and allows them to come up with stellar ideas for TV shows?

Do you think this type of creativity extends beyond Israel's borders and is applicable to all Jews?

2. Cultural adaptations

A couple of the American shows (*Homeland*, *Echo 3*) that were mentioned in the video changed the focus or the presentation of the show as compared to the Israeli original (*Hatufim*, *When Heroes Fly*). For example, whereas *Homeland* is a CIA thriller, which deals with espionage, politics, and America's post-9/11 anxieties, *Hatufim* is a psychological drama focusing on three soldiers returning after being held in captivity for many years.

- Why do you think American producers chose to alter focus for their TV adaptations rather than staying true to the tone of the original shows?
- Can you think of any cultural differences between the audiences that might account for these changes (e.g., Israel has mandatory army service whereas most Americans do not serve in the armed forces)?

3. In Treatment in demand

Betipul is a show in which episodes allow viewers to sit in on a session between a therapist and patient. The show doesn't involve a lot of action and tends to be dialogue heavy. It also happens to be one of the most remade shows globally, with 20 international versions.





Why do you think this show, in particular, has been adapted for such a
wide variety of international audiences? Is there something about the
premise of the show that you think might speak to people of different
cultures? Explain your answers.

Learning Activities

1. Lesson plan

2. Make your pitch

Split students into small groups and have them come up with an idea for a TV show about Jewish life or life in Israel. Groups should prepare the following in order to pitch their show to the rest of the class:

- Name of the show
- Names and descriptions of the main characters
- Brief synopsis of the show
- · Genre of the show
- Target audience for the show
- Poster advertising the show

3. A taste of Israeli television

As a class, view trailers for some <u>Israeli TV shows</u> not mentioned in the video. Some shows to preview include:

- Tehran
- Fauda
- Hit & Run
- Shtisel
- Trust No One

After viewing each trailer, ask students the following questions:





- What is this show about?
- Who do you think the target audience is for this show?
- Did this show remind you of a show from your country that you've watched or have heard about? If so, which one(s) and what are the similarities?
- Do you think this show could be adapted in a different country? Why or why not?
- 4. Give your students our Kahoot on Israeli TV shows!

Reflection Questions

1. That show sounds familiar

Did you previously know that the American shows mentioned in the video are adaptations of Israeli TV shows? Were you surprised to hear this fact? Why or why not?

Have you seen any of the shows mentioned in the video? If so, which ones and what do you think of them? If not, which of these shows do you think you might enjoy and why?

What do you think these shows teach viewers about Israeli society? Support your answers by citing specific shows and their themes.

2. Responding to conspiracy theories

In the early days of Hollywood, Jews were involved in starting major film studios such as Universal, Paramount and MGM. Today, there are some who say that Jews run Hollywood and believe in a conspiracy theory that Jews are behind every decision and trend in the industry.





What do you think about the conspiracy theory that Jews run Hollywood? Do you think that American TV studios finding inspiration from Israeli shows adds fuel to the fire in regard to this theory? Explain your answers.

Have you ever been confronted with the conspiracy theory that Jews run Hollywood or any other industry? Describe the interaction and how you responded to it. What do you think is the best way to react when others promote antisemitic conspiracy theories like the Jews controlling Hollywood, the media, the government, or other institutions?

3. Exploring themes and cultures

Analyzing the themes that are depicted in TV shows and movies can provide insight into the values and culture of a country. What were some common themes that are present in the Israeli TV shows that you learned about in the video? What do you think this says about Israeli culture and life in Israel?

What are common themes in the shows that are popular in your country? What do you think this says about the culture and everyday life in your country?

What are common themes in the shows that you watch? What do you think your preferences in television shows say about you?
