Historical Fiction

Historical fiction has <u>real</u> historical events, <u>real</u> historical settings, and may have real people from history, <u>but the main characters are often fictional</u>. Think of a time period you would like to know more about. See your librarian/ teacher for book suggestions. Your book must be close to 100 pages (I prefer 120, but I know historical fiction are usually smaller books).

Note: This is <u>not</u> a non-fiction information book, and it is <u>not</u> a biography.

- Examples of Historical Fiction: George Washington's Socks, The Whipping Boy, A Long Way from Chicago, Esperanza Rising, American Girl (if long enough), The Witch of Blackbird Pond, A Single Shard, etc. Each of these books teaches about a real time period and/or events (such as the Middle Ages, the Revolutionary War, etc.), and may have real people mixed with fictitious characters/stories. Many of the Core Knowledge books we are reading this year (i.e. Robin Hood) are historical fiction.
- Examples of books that are <u>not</u> considered historical fiction are: *Medieval World*, *Valley Forge*, *Who Was...Thomas Edison? The First Woman Doctor*, etc. While these books are historical, they strictly contain information with no fiction and can't fall under the historical fiction category.

Instructions:

You will need 4 pieces of plain white paper.

1. Take a piece of  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  in. paper and fold/cut until you have a square.





2. Fold the square in half, diagonally BOTH ways, and then open the paper back up.



3. Cut from one corner to the middle.



4. Slide one cut half under the other cut half. This will be the bottom of your triangle. After you color all three sides, secure it with tape or a staple.

## HOW TO ILLUSTRATE EACH TRIANGLE:

- 5. In each triangle draw a <u>scene</u> from your historical fiction book. Each triangle should be <u>colored completely and neatly</u>. Depict a <u>SEQUENCE</u> telling the story of the book.
  - a. Triangle 1- a scene from the beginning of the book (5 pts.)
  - b. Triangle 2 & 3- a scene from the middle of the book (5 pts. each)
  - c. Triangle 4- a scene from the end of the book (5 pts)
- 6. Now is the time to secure each triangle together with tape or a staple.
- 7. Finally, staple the 4 triangles together, back to back. Your teacher will help you secure a string to the top.
