Key words commonly used to express comparison include:

Like, similar, as, Same, in the same way, too, Both, have in common, the same as, similarly, as well as,

Key words commonly used to express contrast include:

Although, yet, whereas, However, but, while, Differ, instead, unless, Unlike, on the contrary, contrary to, even though, on the other hand, the reverse,

Note: When you compare one subject to another, you show how the two are alike, or similar. *Example: The dog, like the cat, is a household pet.*

When you contrast two subjects, you show how they are different. *Example: The dog, unlike the cat, is dependent on its master.*

Sometimes, both comparison and contrast are used in the same sentence. *Example: Both the dog and the cat make good household pets, but a dog requires more attention than a cat.*

Comparison
