English 801A—College English Skills I Spring 2014

COURSE DESCRIPTION

English 801A is an introductory writing course set up to give you the tools you need to succeed in reading and writing in college. Our focus during this semester will be on working toward the composition of grammatically correct sentences, well-developed paragraphs, and college level essays. In short, you are working to prepare yourselves for success in English 801B and beyond. Students who excel in 801A may be recommended to continue directly to English 105.

In this class, we will write in class every day, so you must have your Course Notebook (a spiral dedicated only to English 801A) by the second day of class. We will do all kinds of informal writing (which you will not hand in, but will keep in your Course Notebook), grammar exercises, and rough drafts in your Course Notebook. Your grade in this course is CR/NC, and you must earn a minimum of 70% in order to receive a grade of CR (Credit).

ATTENDANCE:

In accordance with English department policy, any student who misses 8 total or 4 consecutive classes may no longer pass the class and will have to Withdraw him or herself on Peoplesoft or earn a NC. Any student who misses more than 4 total classes may lose 10% of their total point score.

- 1. Read texts to generate ideas for a short piece of writing.
- 2. Write paragraphs with clear topics and logical sequencing.
- 3. Support ideas with relevant details.
- 4. Write sentences that demonstrate rudimentary control of written English.

Bringing your thoughts and ideas in a respectful, collegial way to class earns you positive points. Detracting from class discussion, doing other work, disrupting class, arriving late, or using hate speech gives you negative points.

- · Keep up with the reading and writing assignments every day.
