With the multitude of opportunities offered with ELG funding, Caldwell city trips had not been on the top of my list until the New York City trip was announced. I had never been to NYC before, and became excited at the prospect of visiting one of the most famous cities in the world. Coming off of a summer internship in my hometown, I was ready to have an adventure and reconnect with my fellow fellows. Upon arriving at our hotel, we had about an hour and a half before we needed to be at the Caldwell alumni connection event. A few of us decided to squeeze in a trip to the library, which would be closed for the rest of the weekend. The Immigrant Experience

The next morning, we woke up and as a group visited the Tenement Museum. If planning the trip myself, I would have almost certainly overlooked this museum amongst the extensive list of museums and attractions the city has to offer. However, I am so glad that we took the time to visit, as the museum offered an organized, engaging look at the history of two families that lived

in the tenements that have since been restored and converted into the museum. Hearing about specific people, what led them to New York, and a view of their daily life was such an effective way to convey the themes of the immigrant experience in the city. Following the museum, we hopped on the ferry to Ellis Island, with a brief stop near the Statue of Liberty. My grandfather's



parents had immigrated through Ellis Island, and I was curious to expand on my basic knowledge of the process that they went through upon arriving in the United States. Walking through the exhibit, I was able to gain a much better understanding of what it must have felt like to be someone going through the inspection and processing upon arriving on the island. While we had a somewhat quick visit on the island, I learned a lot and left with much to think about, comparing the historical

immigrant experience to what we have today. Later that evening, our group had the privilege of seeing the Buena Vista Social Club on Broadway. This musical contained some of the most impressive feats of human abilities I have seen in my entire life. The singing was incredible, the music was unbelievable, and I was completely captivated by the storyline from start to finish. Having taken a trip to Cuba in high school that was highly oriented towards interacting with locals and experiencing the culture, I was looking forward to hearing Cuban music and learning more about Cuba's history and culture.
