Please *read these instructions carefully*. Ask questions if anything is unclear.

It's time to start working on this unit's research project 📄

You will work in groups to prepare and deliver a PowerPoint presentation about a major genocide that has occurred in recent history.

During this presentation, you will be considered the teachers. Below you will find:

1. A description of the process for preparing and delivering your presentation.
2. An outline of the requirements you have chosen for this project.
3. The rubrics by which you will be graded.

Remember: ask questions if anything is unclear.

Process

- Today (Friday, February 18, 2011), you will be put into groups, and your group will choose by lottery system the genocide you will work on, as well as the date on which your group will present.
- Over the break: Begin doing some basic research and reading about your genocide. You should *at least* answer the Overview Questions (see outline below).
- When we get back from break:
 - Al and Peter will present a model PowerPoint presentation based on the Cambodian genocide, which will follow the outline and will be an example of an A project.
 - You will work in class, individually and in groups, on your presentations.
- **Your PPT file, Outline, Worksheet Handouts, and Supplemental Reading/Visual Materials with Complete Works Cited are due at least 3 school days prior to your actual presentation date.**
 - **You will receive a HW grade for each of these items submitted.**
 - **Each day late results in 5 points off your total grade.**
- **Presentations will commence on Monday, March 7, 2011.**
- **When your presentation is complete, you will then grade you and your group using the Rubrics below.**

General Requirements

- PowerPoint file
- Outline of PowerPoint Presentation
- Worksheet for classmates with important dates, names, events, and questions.
 - a. Peter and Al will make copies for you, but you need to bring an original copy at least 3 school days prior to the date of your presentation.
- Supplementary Reading/Visual Materials
 - b. At least two works of: Poetry, Fiction, Non-Fiction Narratives, Artwork, Other Multimedia (film, music, etc). Your choice, as long as they document the genocide in some way. Think back to the various resources you've been exposed to in class.
- Works Cited
 - c. This should include your Supplementary Reading/Visual Materials, PLUS all sources used to create your PPT file (books, Web sites, films, articles, journals, images, etc)
 - d. You should have both Primary and Secondary sources: novels, anthologies, books, films, letters, contracts, Web sites, etc.
- Visuals: photos, maps, art, film clips, etc.
 - e. Use these to accentuate your PowerPoint. Be creative.

Group Work Requirements

1. Each individual member of the group is responsible for the entire presentation.
2. You will receive a group grade.
3. Each person must speak and participate as a group, during both prep-activities and during the presentation itself.
4. Each person should be responsible for specific (and equal) portions of the presentation); however, the group must work together as a team to compile information and present the final project.
5. You must:
 - a. Come see Peter with the final draft of your PowerPoint file and all other presentation materials ***at least 3 school days prior to the date of your presentation.***
 - b. Rehearse your presentation: make eye contact, project your voice, maintain professional posture/body language/demeanor, and have a positive attitude. Remember: When you're presenting, you are the teacher.
 - c. Coordinate delivery of each portion of your presentation *before* you present . . .
 - d. No reading from note-cards (you must *know* the facts); you are teaching the class
 - e. Failure to meet these conditions will result in a failing grade. No exceptions.

PowerPoint/Outline Requirements

Overview

1. Where? When? Who? How? Why?
2. How Long?
3. How many people?
4. Other Facts?

Context

Before

1. What are the historical events, cultural and social-economic conditions, and prevailing attitudes that led to genocide/human rights violations?
2. What was the conflict?
3. Who are the major players involved?
4. What are the ideologies and prejudices that clashed?

During

1. What exactly happened? Why was it genocide? What were the methods used by the perpetrators?
 - a. The weapons that were used; methods of torture and how the perpetrators controlled, what they destroyed, and how they alienated individuals from society.
 - b. Specific uniforms for perpetrators? Victims?
2. What do primary and secondary sources and personal accounts tell us about this genocide? (Newspaper articles; TV reports; Autobiographies; Memoirs; History Books; Movies; Poetry; Fiction; etc)
3. Who were the victims? Who were the victimizers?
4. Who were the oppressors? Who were the oppressed?
 - a. If at all, how were the lines blurred between the victims and victimizers, between the oppressors and the oppressed?
5. Why was genocide/human rights violation able to occur? What was the international community's response, if any, regarding this genocide?

After

1. How did the genocide end?
2. What was the international community's response?
 - a. What laws are currently in place to stop genocides from happening?
3. What happened to the victimizers? (Trials; Justice; Repercussions; etc)
4. What happened to the victims? What were their reactions/responses? How did they cope? (Refugee camps; exodus; retributions; remunerations; etc)
5. How was the country able to re-build itself? (Infrastructure; Socio-political-economic; cultural; etc)

6. Images of how lands use to look before and after the introduction of genocide.

PowerPoint/Outline Requirements (Continued)

Analysis and Interpretation

Some of the key questions to address are:

1. What steps have the citizens taken to restructure their country after experiencing such profound destruction?
2. How do war and genocide affect the psyches of individual survivors?
3. How do people live purposeful lives after experiencing war and genocide?
4. How do people retain faith and trust in society, government, and humanity in spite of past betrayal and cruelty?
5. Why is it vital to preserve culture after genocide?
6. Who is responsible, and what can be done to prevent genocides from occurring and/or remedy prior acts of genocide.
7. What we can do as Americans to help those who have suffered genocides and other atrocities?
8. What role has America played in these genocides and human rights violations?
9. What have you learned (individually and as a group) and what are your reactions?
