Facilitator's Guide for Intro to 1.1 Social Emergency Medicine and Social Determinants of Health

Introduction Welcome to our session on Social Emergency Medicine, where we explore the profound impact of non-medical drivers on patient health. Today, we will delve into the "Cliff of Good Health" analogy by Camara Jones and discuss how social determinants of health shape outcomes, particularly in emergency care settings.

Session Outline

- o Explore the concept of a team-based cascade of care for social emergencies, similar to medical emergencies.
- o Encourage thinking about systems interventions, education, advocacy, and research in Social Emergency Medicine.

- o Invite participants to share experiences or concerns about recognizing and addressing social determinants in their practice.
- o Discuss potential barriers and solutions for integrating social care into emergency medicine.

7. Conclusion and Next Steps

- o Summarize key points from the session.
- o Encourage participants to consider how they can apply these concepts in their work environments.
- o Provide resources for further learning and implementation of social determinants health strategies.

Evaluation
