


Picture #1





- b. Seeing a picture of people stumbled from the accident on the Brooklyn Bridge, you could tell that people had a hard time trusting the Brooklyn Bridge. They were unsure that the bridge was stable enough but once the 21 elephants crossed the Brooklyn Bridge they earned their trust.

### Important changes to the Brooklyn Bridge

- a. In 1915, the name of the bridge officially became the Brooklyn Bridge.
- b. It became a toll free bridge.

- a. Women in history have not been appreciated for their hard work and contribution.
- b. There were certain stunts that people would create to get attention such as a man "jumping" off the bridge.

- 1. Newspaper- printed publication that consists of folded sheets of paper that has daily news, articles, advertisements and correspondence.
- 2. Collection- an action of collecting something like books, photos, clippings, etc.
- 3. Clippings- an article that is cut from a newspaper or magazine.
- 4. Technical Survey- part of a continuous process of gatherings, processing and analyzing of data.
- 5. The Brooklyn Eagle- Daily newspaper published in the city and then later on published in brooklyn for 114 years.

6. Archives- a collection of historical documents or records providing information about a place, institute or people.

- 2. Newspaper articles around the year the bridge was starting the construction. Letters from public figures about the agreement between two cities.
- 3. Check articles on the Brooklyn Eagle Check old photographs from archives
