We use verb + ing...

- a) After prepositions: Before reading the text, we'll take a look at the title.
- b) After certain verbs + object: I can't stand the thought of him playing the drums.
- c) As part of a continuous verb form: I am listening to the audio track.
- d) "Being" as part of continuous passive verb forms: When we entered the room, the child was being told off by its mother.
- e) After certain verbs (verb patterns and state verbs): I dislike eating snails.
- f) After **despite** or **in spite of**. Despite feeling under the weather, she went to the audition.
- g) As the subject (or part of the subject) of a verb: Parking your car in the middle of my driveway is out of the question.
- h) In reduced relative clauses¹: The lady dancing on the stage is your aunt.
- i) As an adjective: He's a really interesting person to talk to.
- j) After certain expressions: It's no use / It's no good, there's no point in, it's (not) worth, have difficulty/trouble, a waste of money/time, go
- *k)* When two things happen at the same time: *He ran out of the house shouting.*
- When one action happens during another action: He hurt his ankle playing basketball.
- m) After while or when: I was reading a book while listening to the radio.
- n) If one short action follows another short action: *Taking her keys out of her pocket, she opened the car.*
- o) To explain something, or to say why somebody does something. Then it usually comes at the beginning of the sentence:
 - Being unemployed is a very difficult situation to deal.
 - Having already seen the film twice, I decided to watch something else.
- p) Be / get used to: When I first arrived to Scotland, I had to get used to driving on the left. As I have now been living here for two years, I am now more than used to driving on the left.

¹ Reduced relative clauses can take place when the defining relative clause contains a continuous or passive verb form. In these cases, the *who*, *that* or *which* and the auxiliary can be left out. This structure is very common in spoken English: The man (who was) painting the fence is my neighbor.
