Men's 2nd

We were knocked out in the semi-final stage of the championship. Following promotion to the Division 5 league, we assembled the lads on the 21st of November for a 5-week block of Strength & Conditioning, breaking for Christmas and returning in January 2024. Challenge games against St Maurs, Clann Mhuire, and Blanchardstown prepared us for our first league game away against Wanderers. A dominant performance saw us secure our first win and, more importantly, league points. This led into games against St Brigids, Garristown, and Vincents — a tough run, but the lads never wavered.

We picked up some hard-fought, important points, as well as some unlucky losses during our campaign. Injuries, J1s, and exams caused our numbers to drop, testing the depth of our squad. The introduction of minor footballers to the panel during this period helped us maintain some momentum. The minor players stepped up and performed well.

A positive run saw us finish the league and retain our Division 5 status for 2025.

Preparation for the championship quickly followed. A first-round defeat to a strong Cuala side was an eye-opener for the standard required to compete at this level. Our lads responded by topping the group and securing home advantage in the quarter-final against Naomh Olaf's. A win brought us to the semi-final, where we were defeated by eventual champions BSJ.

Overall, there were many positives to take from the year. We achieved our set objectives: maintaining Division 5 status was our minimum, and promotion was our first goal. Our championship run left us just short of intermediate championship football for next year.

Year on year, we have made steady, positive progress in becoming a strong, competitive team, developing the standards of players, fitness, and skill set, while also balancing youth



and experience within the squad. Our ongoing objective is to develop and acclimatise young players to the demands of adult football while maintaining competitiveness.

It has been a thoroughly enjoyable year. Although there was no silverware, it has been a successful year in our eyes.

It has been a pleasure managing this developing team alongside Stephen, John, Conor, and Shane — a great group of lads who have given a lot of time, energy, and effort to the team. We have decided to step away after three years with this group and want to wish them all the best in their continued development and playing years with this brilliant club. The future is bright for them.

Men's 3rd

We started the year with several defeats in friendlies but continued to work hard and devise a pattern of play to suit our squad. We managed to tighten up our defence, and our philosophy was to break quickly and deliver the ball into the opponents' danger area as soon as we could. This paid dividends for us, winning 11 games and drawing one which enabled us to gain promotion in the league.

We then commenced our championship campaign with a comprehensive win over Castleknock to top the group stage. Quarter final was vs Na Fianna, where we ran out 5-point winners. We played Clann Mhuire, Naul in a tense, fast paced semi-final, eventually winning by a slim margin to set up a home final vs Ballyboden St. Endas. The panel received a video message the night before the final from Kieran "geezer" McGeeney, Armaghs winning All-Ireland Manager, and this set the tone for the final, emphasising we did not play the occasion but stuck to our game plan.

After a tense opening 15/20 minutes, we eventually started to dominate possession, and turned this dominance into scores, running out convincing championship winners by 15pts to 0.5pts

We did not concede a goal in championship and only conceded goals in 4 out of 18 competitive games all season, a testament to our goalkeeper and defence. Up front, with fast flowing balls into the forwards, we regularly outscored opponents by big margins, to



gain promotion and win our championship, in what was a fabulous season of achievement for an excellent panel and coaching team.

Men's 4th

This was an opportunity for players of the past years to come back into the club and play again and play alongside the players of the future.

It was a stepping stone for players from minor into adult football and exposure to the adult Division and the different level of the game. The team won some and lost some, it brought players out of retirement and even gave the opportunity for Fathers to play alongside there Sons ,but the overall goal was achieved to get a development squad in the 4th Team and also just an opportunity for players who cannot commit fully to still have the opportunity to play for Pats. It was a successful year and now an established Team for the future.

Adult Hurlers

The adult hurlers had one of our more successful seasons. After a period of uncertainty in late 2023 and the loss of some key players, this year was an unknown quantity. However, with the help of some new players and the return of others as the season progressed we finished joint top of our league and entered championship season in a positive place. The team continued to perform well and we went into championship quarter finals unbeaten. While we ultimately lost the championship final, overall the season was a very positive one. Minor Boys

The Minor Boys panel consisted of 56 players spread across 3 teams, entering league competitions at Division 2, 5 North and 6 North. The 2nd team were competitive throughout their league campaign whilst the focus with the 3rd team was to complete the league campaign and be able to keep the numbers playing to enter a 3rd team into Championship. The 1st team won Division 2, remaining unbeaten across their games.

Post summer the 3 teams competed in A, D and F Championships respectively, with the 1sts and 3rds finishing second in their groups and the 2nds winning their 3 group games to finish top. At the quarter-final stage, the 2nds exited at home versus Round Towers of Lusk whilst the 1sts and 3rds had wins on the road versus St Vincents and St Jude's. At the semi-final stage, our 3rds lost away to a strong St Fininan's Newcastle team whilst the 1sts had a memorable win away to Kilmacud Crokes to qualify for their final. St Jude's were the opposition in the final and like the first group game, they proved too tough opponents and deserving winners on the day.

Overall, the key achievement in the year was having 3 minor teams compete in league and championship for the first time and then capping the year off with an appearance in the A Championship Final. Player and team development remained a key goal across the year and in general, this would also be a goal we feel we achieved.

U13 Boys

The 2011 Boys Football team have had a very exciting season in 2024. This was their first year playing in their own age category. Due to having a small squad size the 2011 boys have had to play up a year for the last number of years. As more numbers started coming down, we decided last year to enter them into their own age group this season. It couldn't have been a better year for the team, with some great support from the 2012 boys. They went unbeaten through their grading games and managed to jump a up another division post grading to ensure they were competing at the best level for them. They had an excellent league campaign ending the year unbeaten winning the league in style!

U12 Boys

This year saw us transition from Go Games to a series of grading games and then Leagues. We fielded two Football teams in Divisions 4 & 10 and one Hurling team in Division 4. We put two football teams in to give all of the boys we had as much playing time as possible. It was a stretch at times because we were tight for numbers, and we relied heavily on the support of 2013 players who obliged throughout. We also supported the U13 football team with players for some of their league fixtures and rotating players from our group up was a great experience and we think benefited them as helped reinforce the bond between the players in the 2012 and 2011 squads.

We used indoor facilities for the first six weeks of the year to avoid the poor weather and underfoot conditions which allowed us to introduce new athletic development and fitness work which they thrived doing. We incorporated some of this into our training for the rest of the year. We also ran a series of (six so far) Sibling Sessions where older siblings of players took a training session. The purpose of this was manifold but fundamentally it was about creating awareness and connections across the club between our group and other teams vis-a-vis older players. The sessions went well and we feel we



achieved their purpose too. By the end of the year, we will have had more than 70 training sessions with good attendance throughout.

We played several challenge matches throughout the year and hosted two Ulster clubs - St Comhgalls from Co. Antrim and Craobh Rua, Camlough, Co. Armagh. During the year our players also took part in both the Football and Hurling Mini All-Ireland competitions as well as several invitational tournaments in both Football and Hurling including a 7-a-side blitz in Antrim.

We began the year with a squad of 25 players and we finish the year with a squad of 25 players though the make-up has changed with two leaving - to prioritise other sports - and another two joining. We have a policy of always welcoming players new or returning and we will continue with this open-door approach.

We enjoyed trips to Croke Park for the Dublin league double header in February and the Leinster SHC final in May. We also ran our social mixed Rounders again during July and August which while social was quite competitive. This was also an opportunity to include players from other squads - including the 2013 boys and the 2012 and 2013 girls - so they get to know one another while playing together.

Thanks as always to our players, parents, and coaches for their continued involvement and support throughout the year. I want to thank my fellow - Lana, Mark, Matt, Shane and Thomas - without whom we couldn't mentor the players and manage the teams we have.

U11 Boys

Balanced group, with ~20% strong and ~20% weaker players all getting game time and progressing at their own pace. The average is comparable with the teams we have faced, and the boys are benefiting from the game time. We are training on both codes each week and all matches except Margarets have been on both codes. The team now have their full kit courtesy of Glenveagh and are excited to be a team. As the boys grow, we are embedding team culture, team spirit and mutual respect. We are using two small trophies from the Mini All Irelands as weekly prizes for the most respectful player and one for the player who tried their hardest this week and that is reinforcing the behaviours we are role modelling to them. Coaching numbers and space for equipment are challenges we are trying to overcome and would appreciate the club's support in finding solutions.

Ladies 1

The Pats Ladies team had a Successful year overall, with plenty of highs and lows along the way. A tough start in Division 3 losing both of their first two games in the division to regroup and finish the league in 4th place with the standout win being against the Junior A champions from 2023 Scoile Ui Chonaill in their own backyard. Throughout the year we have had an average of 8 girls training every week, with sometimes only 4 girls arriving for training. Sunday games were proving very difficult to manage with LGFA competing against other sports played on Sundays. This had been challenging in relation to trying to translate learning from games to training and vice versa not to mention team development and cohesion. Despite this however the girls did very well in the Spring League, finishing mid table.

In Autumn a decision was made, in a bid to be better able to field a team at the weekends to enter an U15's Saturday Single Code at Div7. Our vision was to build momentum within the sport, with weekly games and entering the girls at a space where they could have good games. That was certainly achieved and the girls shone through this. While we only had 13 girls on our team, we worked tirelessly week in to get support from U13's LGFA to field a team. We continued to train twice weekly with low numbers. Yet again the girls proved their value and showcased their skill base very well and were successful in getting to two Finals - Championship against an extremely strong Kilmacud and Single Code against Terenure Singe Street. It is a testament to all that they achieved so much despite the challenges. The girls walked away from a 2009 competition with their heads held very high. There is no way, without the continued support from Liam's U13's LGFA , that we would have been able to achieve that.

We plan to have celebrations early December to mark the girls' achievements.

We are now however in a more challenging position for next year - with 2 coaches available, a shortage of players and a Feile year ahead of us and look toward



2024 with concerns regarding numbers. We envisage to have 11 girls and a need to rely heavily on Liam's U13's. The challenges with this are that we cannot train as a team to translate learnings and team development, team building and cohesion as we also continue to compete with other sports. We will however endeavour to continue to support the girls to continue playing LGFA and continue current efforts and continue to request support from the club to recruit.

The main challenge we will face, as always, will be to maintain and even grow our numbers.

We will aim to do this by ensuring the Club is a place that the girls enjoy coming to, to train and play matches, week after week, month after month and year after year.



U9 Girls

The 2015 girls completed the first part of the u9 go games season in the two team leagues in camogie and football. However, they moved to the three-team league from August onwards. This has given them a much more challenging and rewarding run. The move was enabled thanks to several recruitments drives over the year, including the Gaelic for girls' program, a bring your friend to training ask, and outreach to local WhatsApp's and schools. Most recently the GPO sessions in the school is proving very good at building interest in joining the school. We added over 10 new members, with several new players trying out now. After a challenging start to the three team leagues the girls have more than held their own.

Some of the key events in build our team cohesion has been the team days we have done. Most prominently was a trip to Parnell Park where the girls got to play the half time camogie games at the Dublin v Limerick game. A good luck video from Dublin captain, Aisling Maher, added to the excitement as did meeting the team for photos and signatures afterwards.

We continue to focus on core skills and ensure the girls have fun and build strong relationships with their teammates.

U8 Girls
