For example: *She isn't wearing a dress.*

Remember! (Match the pronoun to the correct form of the verb TO B)

HE AM – AM NOT

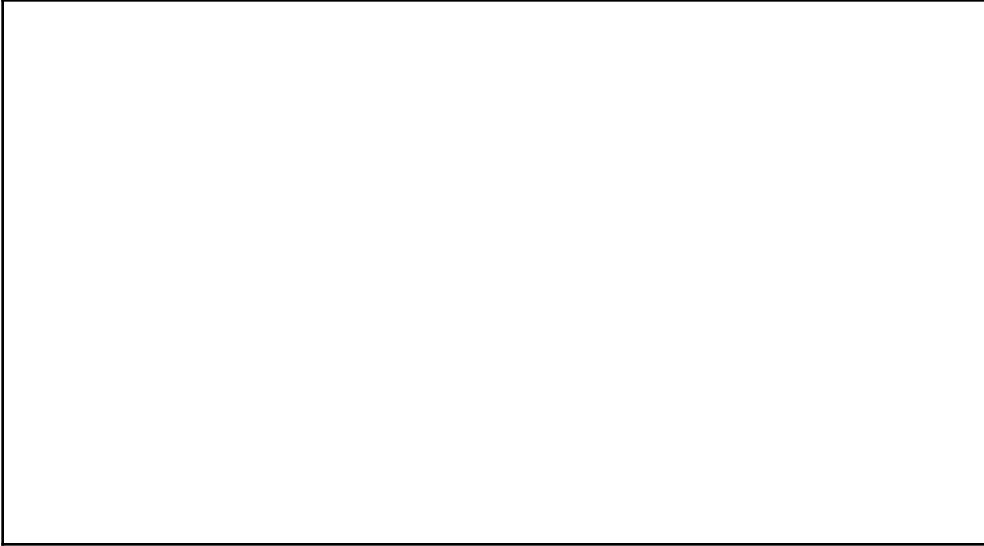

POSSESSIVE PRONOUNS AND POSSESSIVE ADJECTIVES

	Subject pronouns	Possessive adjectives	Possessive pronouns
singular	I	my	mine
	you	your	yours
	he	his	his
	she	her	hers
plural	we	our	ours
	you	your	yours
	they	their	theirs

- Use possessive adjectives before a noun.
This is your book.
- Use possessive pronouns when there is no noun.
This is yours.
- Possessive pronouns match the person, not the possession.
Those jeans aren't hers. They're his.
