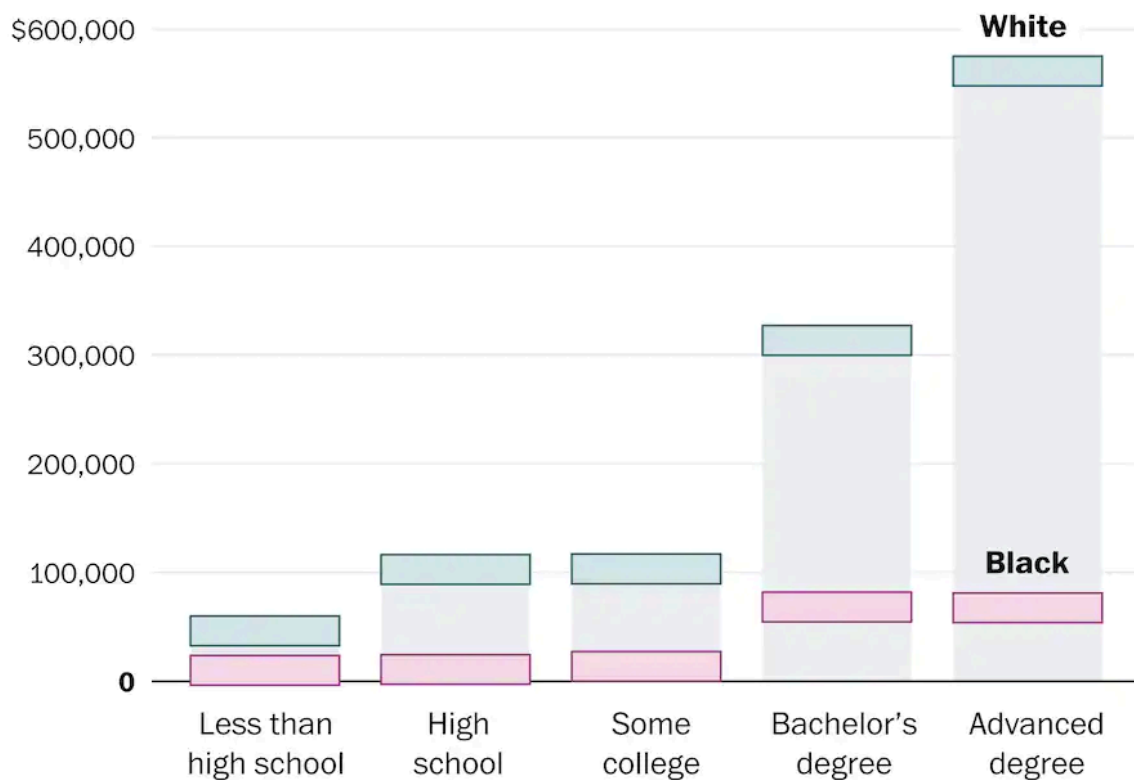
Trump's cabinet

Whites make more money than blacks do, even with the same levels of education, even with the same job

- Wealth Gap
- 2016 Median wealth by household
- White households median income \$171,000
- Black households median income is \$17,100 (Pew Research Center)

At every education level, black wealth lags

Median household wealth by race and education level, 2016

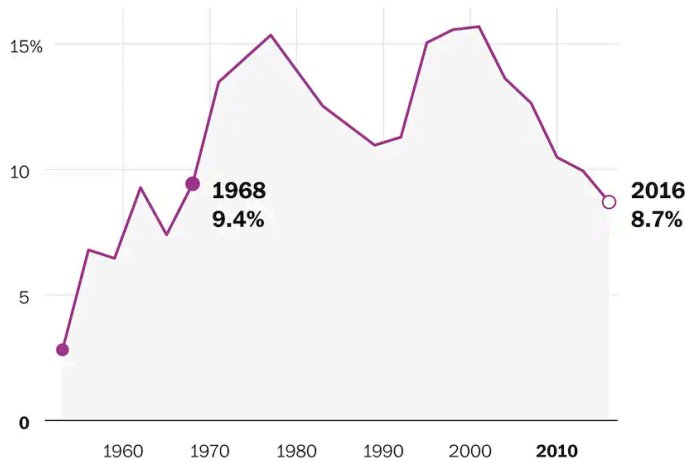

Blacks are both more likely to be unemployed and underemployed (Bureau of Justice Statistics)

- April unemployment and underemployment of whites and blacks
- 16.7% of African Americans
- 14.2% of Whites

Blacks don't participate in the Stock Market (Including 401(K) and Retirement Savings (Gallup)

- 36% of African Americans own stocks
- 60% of Whites own stocks

Homeownership as of Jan 2017 (Pew Research Center)

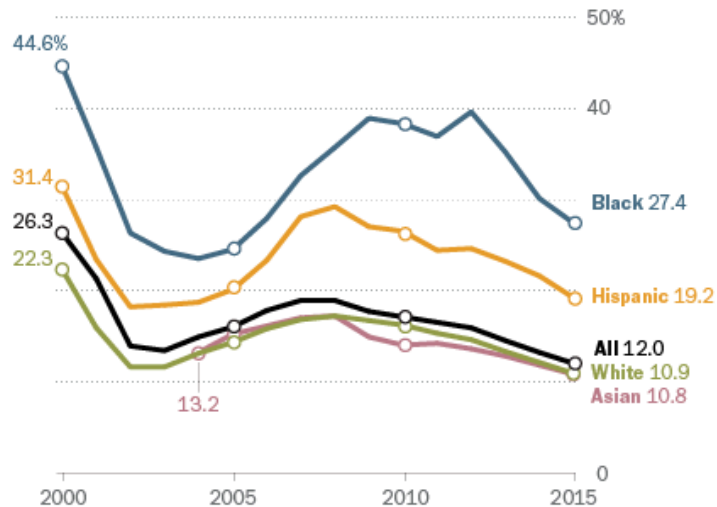
- 41.3% of Blacks
- 71.9% of Whites

Rate of Denial for Mortgages (Pew Research Center)

- 27.4% of Blacks
- 11% of White/Asian

Despite recent improvements, blacks and Hispanics still have harder time getting mortgages

Blacks consistently have higher mortgage rates

Transportation

The Highway system when constructed largely skipped over majority-black neighborhoods

Federal Infrastructure Investment 2008-2015 (Highway Trust Fund)

- \$59 billion on highway transit
- \$10.8 billion on mass transit

Households without a car (Center for Community Change/Civil Rights Project at Harvard 2003)

- 24% of African Americans
- 7% of Whites

Parents in the Workforce/Children under 6 with all adults working
(Center for American Progress 2016)

- 75% of African Americans have all adults working
- 63% of whites have all adults working

Daycare for a 4-year-old infant makes up 42% of their median income

Education

Districts with primarily non-white demographics receive \$23 Billion dollars less in funding than primarily white districts despite serving roughly the same number of kids (EdBuild)

Less money leads to fewer choices

- Less money for teachers
- Less access to extracurricular activities
- School supplies etc.

Lower property taxes lead to lower funding due to lower-income neighborhoods having lower property taxes.

Even when adjusting for income, poor white students receive on average \$1,487 more per student than similarly situated black students. (\$12,987 for poor white students, \$11,500 for AA)

Black Male students vs White Male Students discipline

- 83% of Black male students have at least one disciplinary infraction
 - 59% of White male students have at least one disciplinary infraction
- (2011 Study of Texas Schools for Council of State Governments Justice Center)

Black vs White Student suspensions (2016 US Department of Education Study)

- 12.8% of blacks have been suspended
- 6.1% of whites have been suspended

Suspensions in relation to a students' chances of ending up in the Juvenile Justice System

- 23% of students with at least one suspension end up in the Juvenile Justice System
- 2% of students without any suspensions end up in the Juvenile Justice System

Food Insecurity (UN Human Rights Report)

- 26.1% of African Americans
- 10.6% of Whites

Greater than 54% of the African American population breathes unclean air
