**Guidelines for Intercultural Discussions**

1. Be familiarized with the communication technologies to be used, VoiceThread, Zoom, etc.
2. Make use of multimodal resources (audio mode, video modes, pre-recorded videos, text, pictures, graphs, graphic organizers, links, etc.) to make your points clear and the communication lively.
3. Use official documents (e.g., curriculum guides, policy papers, etc.), scientific articles, reports, online resources, etc., to help your intercultural partners understand the information you are providing.
4. Have a clear understanding of the discussion questions. Do not hesitate to use your personal experiences to illustrate your points.
5. Ask open-ended questions, for example, why, how, what types of questions. Encourage your partners to share their thoughts and information by signing understanding, for example, nodding (if face-to-face) or posting emoji.
6. Use polite language, for example, would you, could you, please, thank you, do you mind, paying compliments, etc.
