
# 2.Key Notes:

The idea of keeping track of time is called **Temporal Thinking**.

Devices (tools) used by Historians include:


- 1. Eras or a large span of time.
- 2. Calendars to keep track of days, months, and years.
- 3. Timelines to help organize time in a simpler visual way.
- 3. We will start with Eras. What exactly are eras? Eras are shown on the timeline below. They are large spans of time that have similar lifestyles happening. A major event in history ends the era and begins a new one. For example, the invention of farming ended the lifestyle of hunting for food to the new lifestyle of growing food. There are four main Eras that we will be studying. They are written in red below: Prehistory, Ancient History, Middle Ages, Modern History.

- 4. The next example of a timeline is called a Geohistogram. Make three observations about this timeline.




Why would historians use this style of timeline? How could this help you better understand world history?

## **Timeline Basics**

There are a few parts all timelines have in common and in order to read a timeline you need to make sure you understand the following:

- 1. **Chronological order** all dates on a timeline go in order from the earliest event to the most recent events.
- 2. **Increments-** All timelines go up or down by the same increment of time (by hour, day, year, 1000's of years).
- 3. **BC/AD-**Timelines that date before Christ are dated differently than dates after Christ. See the timeline below.

#### BC means before Christ- makes sense BUT


AD does NOT mean after death it actually means Anno Domini (Latin for year of the Lord).

SO... year 1 starts when Jesus was BORN not when he died. \*\*But what if you do not believe in Jesus? Instead of using BC and AD historians can use BCE and CE.

**BCE** means before the common era (Before Christ)

**CE** means common era (Once Christ was born)


