An Chau: A little bit different. Some kids they are unable, because their family cannot support them financially, to go to school. They have to be on the street and selling things and pick up scrap or whatever to help out their family. But for us, lucky us, we can support during the war. So with the coffee shop, my parents can support me for the school. So that's one thing that I appreciate with my life over there during that time.

Brandon Chau: So you said um, you were going to school uh during the war. Is that right?

An Chau: Yeah.

While I was going to school, I still remember during that time the most... in the memory that was second day of the Lunar New Year in 1968. That's where the city war started. So we cannot go out to the street in that morning. We cannot go out to the street or anywhere, any activity. We have to hide at home, under the bed, or lie on the floor to try to avoid the war and the bullets that get inside the house that can hit somebody. In that couple days, everybody stay home and you can see the war outside on the street. We can hear it. So, when the war stop, then we went out and we saw it. On some of the doors on my street, they have bullets going through because the gun fighting on both sides.

An Chau: Yeah outside of the home on the street. So, [asking wife for translation in English for a Vietnamese word]the alley. In the street it was different. That was a big one. They had the war outside and they go into the alleys. Our house was in the alley. When we went out, we saw it. And even, you know, after the war the fighting stopped and we went out, on the street we saw some dead bodies on the street.

Brandon Chau: Like your neighbors?

An Chau: Oh no, that was people I don't know because those people, they have the gun fighting on both sides.

Brandon Chau: So the soldiers?

An Chau: Kind of like soldiers but not really [asking wife to make sure he translated correctly]. Some of them were communists but some were local. We can't identify who is that. But both sides they had gunshots and shooting on the street.

An Chau: Yeah.

Brandon Chau: And what city was this?

An Chau: Chợ Lớn. I think that Chợ Lớn and Saigon are the same because the [unintelligible] the Chinese New Year affected the whole city.

An Chau: Oh, no, that's the second day of the New Year. Up until the eighth or the ninth day, we were supposed to go back to schoo on the eighth day of the Lunar New Year but all of the schools stopped because of the war. So nobody could go back to school until after that. So you know during that couple days, we saw so many things happen on the street. And kind of like they used something, building up like the sandbags here in the street. And they were shooting. And we saw that on the street.

Brandon Chau: So sandbags-

An Chau: Not sandbags, whatever they could pile up to lay down to fight.

not in the city. That was in the other state of the country. So, only the new year that happened in the city.

An Chau: Yeah, when you up to that age you have to go unless you have the good grades as a student so you can continue to study. So I have good grades so- also my age did not reach the military draft yet.

An Chau: Before 75, my age was not qualified yet. After that, after 1975, the communists tried to draft. But during that time, I'm older so during the day, I have to go to the market to sell something, selling food or whatever to support my family. But at the same time, I have to go to some clinic. So, I have to pretend I have mental problems. Then, I could stay away from the draft because I'm mentally ill.

Brandon Chau: So the Viet Cong were going through the streets to try and get people to join the military?

An Chau: yeah during that time they were trying to draft and people were going to Cambodia. So uh, I try to avoid those. So I have to, you know, pretend I'm mentally ill.

Brandon Chau: You said they were trying to get soldiers to go to Cambodia?

An Chau: Yeah, that time they were trying to draft somebody to go to the military. I tried to avoid the draft and pretend I'm mentally ill.

An Chau: Oh, my brother-in-law had connections. We paid for people who built boats. Then we waited for the day we escape.

An Chau: No no, there are no newspapers for that. But those were privately- they were dealing privately. If the communists found out, you were in trouble. The people were building boats down in the countryside and when they were ready, they let you know the day and we get prepared and then we go.

An Chau: Uh, I don't have to do anything, but the only way thing we have to do we have to save up the money and buy gold. Then, we pay by gold.

Brandon Chau: So how much money uh did it take to buy your way onto a boat?

An Chau: I remember during that time, [asking wife for translation] because you know the way [asking for more translation] about 7 or 8- so me and uncle, me and my brother-Brandon Chau: So you and Uncle left on the same boat?

An Chau: Me and Uncle and my niece [asking for translation in Vietnamese from wife] nephew. Me, my brother, my nephew, and my brother-in-law's brother. The four of us were in the same boat.

Brandon Chau: And just for this interview, could you tell us what their names were?

An Chau: Uncle's name is Hue Chau. H-U-E first name. Last name is C-H-A-U. My nephew's name is Hoac Thanh Duc. First name is D-U-C and the middle name is T-H-A-N-H and the last name is H-O-A-C. The brother of my brother in law, his name is Ha Luong. First name is L-U-O-N-G. The last name is H-A.

But we still need to go because we wanted freedom. So, we took that chance, that little chance, to survive. So, even-during that time we know we never had a chance to see the family again. But the family would rather let us go out to find some freedom to stay out of the communist. That was the only way so we take that chance.

There was no future. So we decided to go. To take that chance to go. Hopefully, we were successful so we have a brighter future out there.

An Chau: No, we have no direction. Only thing they say, you know, when we go from the direction of South Vietnam, maybe, luckily, we will land in Malaysia. But our boat left and in a couple days, the boat died, the engine died. We just floated on the ocean.

An Chau: Yeah I had to take many things. My family helped me prepare so many things. Like a [unintelligible] or a knife or clothing and hiding some dollars in the clothes. And, they made gold into buttons for pants in case when I landed on the islands somewhere, we have- we starving or whatever we needed, we have something to sell or to trade for food. So, most of those items we lost in the ocean because we floated so many days in the ocean. There was no chance to survive because during that time I think we already died in the ocean. We had no chance to survive. The only thing I had left was my pants and the handkerchief my father give to me. That's it. I landed with nothing but the pants.

An Chau: Yeah that's before I escaped, we prepared that. We used the gold to make the button to put in the pants. The gold button, we have to [unintelligible] into black so no one can know it was gold.

Brandon Chau: And you said that your dad gave you a handkerchief before you left?

An Chau: Yeah, I remember that morning, about five o'clock in the morning. During that day, I was still preparing to go to the market to sell the food but suddenly, we received the news. Today was the chance we had to go right away without disturbing or letting people see us. So, 5 in the morning was kind of dark and I had to grab everything and what we prepared before that so we leaving. The time I stepped out to the door, my father give me a handkerchief saying," Oh you know, put this on yourself in case you have to wipe off your nose." During that time, we don't have Kleenex or whatever so we used handkerchief. That handkerchief is still with me right now and the pants. So 5'oclock in the morning I left and that's it. I didn't see my father no more.

An Chau: Um after the first or the second day, the boat left from [unknown village in Vietnam] and the state of [unknown state in Vietnam], that's where I was living. I remember, the third day, I believe April 22nd, in the late afternoon close to the evening, that day it's raining. So, we stay in [same village], I think more than 10, I have to look at my diary, more than 10 days. We living there for many days waiting for the chance to go down to the boats. The boat drove out to the ocean. The boat's engine died. So, you want more details I can look back to my diary and give you more details during the time I escaped.

Brandon Chau: And do you remember anything from those days that you were on the ocean? Did you see anything happen?

An Chau: Oh yeah, there were many things that happened. During the time I stayed in the ocean, I think we get the pirates robbing us about 36 times. I believe so, I think 36 times, I'll look at my diary again. And during that time, the girls in the boat get raped and some people still fighting to searching what- because when the pirates on the boat, they searching. My stuff was everywhere, everybody's stuff was everywhere so people still searching, fighting "this stuff belongs to me, that stuff belongs to me." I remember one of the jacket I have and Uncle have, my brother, we have the dollars inside the coat. Then, people fighting say this jacket belongs to them but actually those belong to us. But during that time, I think we- my life ends in the ocean. There was no hope to survive because we see the boat, we see the Thai airplane so they don't save us. Because during that time, they don't allow anybody to save the refugee from the ocean. So, there are a lot of stories during that time I stay in the ocean. If the airplane comes, they saw the first day and the second day- they went back the second day, they bring the food, like bread or the food. They put in the plastic bag. In the sky, they drove over, they stay far from the boat, they dropped it into the ocean. So me and some other people in the boat swimming out to reach those plastic bags and get the food back into the boat to let the people on the boat to have, to eat. So, soon as I get on the boat, everything is gone because they open up, fighting, to eat. So when I get on the boat, I don't have anything left because everybody already have one. They spread out already.

Brandon Chau: And for the rest of the journey, was there any like food? How did everyone feed themselves?

An Chau: Okay, every time the pirate, you know the pirates right?

Brandon Chau: Yeah.

An Chau: Yeah, they come over our boat, they raping the girls and they searching, they're stealing the goods, what we have, so at the same time they give out water to drink. And some of them, they give some food to you. But most thing we need is water to survive. Without water, we cannot survive. The food, sometimes we have. Most of the time, we don't have. Only we can get the water from them and they get whatever they need from us. The goods from us, because the boat- everybody left- everybody try to escape, everybody try to hide some goods. There are many valuable stuff like for example, the good watch, the gold, the diamonds, everything. Whatever the people have. They come to rob us and they give us- they rob our good and we took the water from them. Kind of like trading. It's a long, long story during that 18 year, in the ocean. We have a lot of stories during that time. So I have to look at my diary, I can tell you more details, every single thing that happened during that time. And we have the-You know, in our boat, in the bottom of the boat, we have many five-gallon containers to keep fresh water. But when the pirates, they come over and search us, I think they think us hide something in those containers. They cut everything, they dump all of the fresh water out to the ocean. That's why we have the container we don't have no more water. The fresh water to drink. So, those empty container, everybody try to get one to hold for their body in case the boat was sinking so we can survive. Also, after a few days, the engine died. We have the spare engine but the engine, the pirates took away. They took our engine. And plus, the one who drive the boat inexperienced. The real one stay back in Vietnam try to make more money for the second boat. The one they send out is unexperienced. That's why our boat had trouble. We stayed in the ocean.

Brandon Chau: And where did you end up landing?

An Chau: Oh, after so many incidents happened during that time, with the pirates raping us, searching us. I remember the most, one of the boats, I believe on their boat had 30 something fishermen or something like that. They had a lot of fishermen in that boat but their leader is chinese [unknown word] or Thailand. When we say pirates, actually they are fishermen from Thailand. You know, they are fishermen from Thailand. We called them pirates but actually they are fishermen from Thailand. But the last boat they had, they try to searching our good so we have nothing left but their leader don't let them do so. They say," No" and don't let them do anything. So, luckily, that guy say, they telling us, they say," Only me, only us can save you guys. Nobody is saving you guys this time because it's illegal to save you guys." He put the

rope to tow our boat because our boat was dying and not running at all and staying in the ocean. We only see the sky and the ocean. We don't see any borders at all during that 6 or 18 days. So, they use the rope to tow our boat for long period of time. So until we see a little bit of border, we are very happy because we know we close to the-

Brandon Chau: The land?

An Chau: Yeah the land, we were close to the land. We were very happy but that boat still towing us closer and closer so we can see the land more closer and closer. Then, they cut the rope. They said," That's it, that's all I can help you guys towing you guys up to here. If I continue tow you guys in, if I get caught, I'm in trouble." Then he cut the rope and he turn around behind our boat, then he tried to use his boat to hit a couple time to let our boat to come closer to the land, which is still far away. But, the boat still far away but no more towing. We just out there. And many of those people including myself. I want to but i don't think is a good idea. So many of them, they jump into the ocean, they try to swim back to the land, which they were unable to because it was too far. You see the land but its too far. Doesn't mean you can swimming into it. But still have many people jump down and try to swim in. And because I'm injured, my finger during the time on the boat. The first of all. The second of all, I'm not going to jump down to swim into it. But I remember that's close to the evening also. There are many small fishing boat, the smaller ones a lot of them. They come out. They save the people from the- try to swimming into the land. They saved them up, they picked them up from the ocean. Then, they helping us to come close to the island so we jumped out of the boat. We went from the ocean, we swim a little bit and walk into the land. So after that, they try to burn the boat right away in case they try to put us back to the ocean.

An Chau: At that time, I tried to go to Canada. The reason is because I know the US the best, but US it takes a longer time to go and also a little bit more time to sponsor the family from Vietnam. That's why I try to wait for Canada. End up I have no option to go to Canada. Finally, I have to go to the US. I know US the best. Everybody know US the best. But, for the quick sponsor for family, during that time everybody say Canada. For the family it's quicker. That's why everybody go to Canada.

Brandon Chau: While you were waiting for the sponsors to come through, what were you doing in the camps?

An Chau: Oh during I stay in the camp. After a couple months, I start try to- because I know several different language, like Chinese and Vietnamese. The people outside, the store owner is Chinese, Thai-Chinese. They don't speak Vietnamese and I speak Chinese and Vietnamese. That's why me and my brother get a job in the two different little shops to helping them sell the stuff for the people into the camp. Because, the market is only open in the morning from 8 to 10. So, you get a job in that two hours to help the people sell something to translate from Chinese to Vietnamese or from Vietnamese to Chinese for the owner. So you get the job from them. And during that time, the life become a little bit better because we have some money to buy more food from the market.

Brandon Chau: And so, after the Philippines, you were allowed to come to the United States?

An Chau: Yes.

Brandon Chau: Who sponsored you?

An Chau: Supposed to be the Catholic Charities. They sponsor us. They say they have a

sponsor in the US. So, as soon as you get off from the airport, your sponsor will pick you up at the airport. But, me and my brother, we landed- I remember that's April 22nd, I believe so. So, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, it's still winter time. Then, after I landed, I go out to the airport, the gate. I thought someone was waiting to pick me and my brother from there. But, there was no one. When we walk out to the airport, I saw snow the first time I say," Oh maybe this is snow because it's cold too. It's snow." We go back inside to the airport. Then, we walk around, no one come to pick us up. They say you put the IBM bag, they have the number on the back, they look at the number and pick you up. Me and Uncle- me and my brother, put the bag on our back, walk around the airport and no one pick us up. We saw two policemen, they come by in the airport and that time, we don't speak any English at all. We come to the policemen, we ask them for help. We pointed to the bag and number, then they know us as refugee without sponsor. Then, they ask us question, we don't know how to answer them, we don't know what they ask of us. End up, they pick me up and my brother up and bring both of us to the police station and stay in the police station for a while. Three hours? Six hours? I forgot. Yeah, we stay in the police station waiting for- they contact the Catholic Charities to send someone to pick us up. And that's why I say when I first come to the US, the first couple hours we have to stay in the police- we have to stay in the police station for a couple hours. Then, after that, they contact with the Catholic Charities. I remember at that night, when one of the gentlemen, they come to pick us up from the police station, they bring us to the motel and let us stay there. At that time, we know the guy told us up to this moment, we still have no sponsor yet and they don't even know we are here. So, me and my brother stay in the motel at that night. So, no food no nothing. Then, wait until next morning, we saw one of the American woman. They come to the motel. I remember the very first time I saw the hamburger. I believe that's the McDonald's hamburger. And they see us in the motel and they give us the hamburger and it tastes so good.
