This new season brings even greater commitment to raising a generation grounded in faith and purpose. Today, our students represent 29 different churches across the region, along with international students from different continents.

1. We Seek Transformation by the Power of Holy Spirit

Holy Spirit transforms lives and strengthens our inner being. We honor and seek to be guided by Him in all that we do at school, allowing His presence to shape both our academic growth and spiritual development. The Spirit empowers our students to live out their faith with purpose, wisdom, and character.

2. We Teach Everything Christian

Everything our students see, hear, and learn at BCS is rooted in Christian values, with the goal of producing works that glorify God. At this foundational age, it is vital to teach truth, equipping students to discern and walk in faith.

3. We Worship God through Education

Our education is God-centered, aiming to glorify Him in every aspect of learning. One of the most beautiful moments at BCS is witnessing young students worshiping God, as described in Psalm 8:2: "Out of the mouths of babes and infants, You have established strength."

FOCUS OF LEARNING

At Base Christian School (BCS), we emphasize holistic education that nurtures every aspect of a child's development—spiritual, intellectual, emotional, physical, social, and creative.

1. **Discipleship**

We believe that every child is created in God's image with the ability to worship, pray, and memorize scripture. Our goal is to disciple students in their walk with God from an early age, fostering a foundation of faith that will guide them throughout their lives.

2. **Character Formation**

Elementary years are pivotal for character development. With Jesus Christ as our ultimate role model, we guide students in understanding and embodying biblical character traits such as kindness, honesty, and humility, both in the classroom and at home.

3. **Childlike Wonder**

We encourage children to explore the beauty of God's creation through outdoor activities, field trips, and hands-on learning experiences. These moments foster a sense of awe and help preserve their innocent, childlike hearts.

4. **Family Environment and Social Dynamics**

At BCS, we prioritize creating a family-like environment where students learn to build healthy relationships with peers and teachers. Through group projects, collaborative learning, and community activities, we teach the value of compassion, teamwork, and conflict resolution as part of growing in Christ-centered social dynamics.

5. **The Arts, Sports, and Physical Development**

STATEMENT OF FAITH

The school has adopted the statement of faith of Base Church.

STATEMENT OF FAMILY VALUES

The leadership, administration, and staff of Base Christian School believe the Bible is the written Word of God without error in all its teachings. Because of our understanding of the Old and New Testaments, our school teaches these Core Family Values:

- That it is unacceptable for Christians to teach hatred against any group or individual
- That human life begins at conception and that an unborn child at any stage of development is a human being and should be treated as such
- That sexual intimacy is only morally acceptable within a marriage relationship

- That marriage is an exclusively heterosexual institution; and that marriage is between one man and one woman
- That premarital sexual intimacy, heterosexual or homosexual, including but not limited to intercourse, is morally wrong

STAFF QUALIFICATIONS

All staff members of Base Christian School are dedicated believers in the Lord Jesus Christ, devoted to the task of training each child in a Christ-centred environment. Each teacher recognizes this service to be a central part of his or her life and is in complete agreement with the doctrinal position of the school. In addition, all staff must demonstrate strong examples of character, culture, and competency in both their personal conduct and professional responsibilities. Each individual must be called to Christian education, be a true worshipper, love God's Word, and deeply love children. Staff members should be gifted in pastoring and teaching, nurturing students spiritually, academically, and relationally as they participate in the mission of Base Christian School. All staff must also be actively dedicated to a local church. An OCT designation or other recognized teaching certificate is preferred but not required.

CRIMINAL REFERENCE CHECKS

BCS submits to the policy of Base Church, Inc. Individuals associated with the school who come into regular contact with students are required to provide the school with a criminal reference check from the Canadian Police Information Centre (CPIC) before becoming associated with the school.

STUDENT HEALTH AND SAFETY

In recognition and support of our goal to provide a healthy and safe workplace and school environment, BCS is committed to the protection and well-being of employees, volunteers, students, and visitors from injury, occupational hazards, and occupational disease.

II ADMISSION AND ATTENDANCE

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students applying to Base Christian School will be admitted on the condition that they are capable of maintaining the spiritual and academic standards of the School.

- Students must be of good character, attitude and citizenship. Gross misbehaviour or continual misconduct will not be tolerated by the School.
- Parents are to be in agreement with our educational purposes, and students must comply with all policies adopted by the School.

The age requirement for Junior Kindergarten is as follows:

The child must be four years of age on or before December 31 of the school year in which they are expecting to enroll.

The age requirement for Senior Kindergarten is as follows:

The child must be five years of age on or before December 31 of the school year in which they are expecting to enroll.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

- Submit non-refundable registration fee
- Complete school application form and tuition payment form
- Student(s) complete screening and testing if applicable
- Attend pre-admission family interview
- The final decision of acceptance will be made on the basis of the information submitted, testing results (if applicable) and interview
- Notification of acceptance by letter

III FINANCIAL INFORMATION

AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The annual financial statements of Base Christian School are distributed to families who are members of Base Church. Families who are not members of Base Church may obtain the annual financial statements of Base Christian School upon request.

CONSUMER PROTECTION INFORMATION

DONATIONS

The “Academy Fund” has been established to provide ongoing support for the school. All financial donations to Base Church marked “Academy Fund” will be issued a receipt for income tax purposes.

TUITION PAYMENT

Tuition payments are due by the 5th of each month, payable via pre-authorized payments or post-dated cheques as per the Tuition Payment Plan.

FUNDRAISING

Various fundraising endeavors will occur throughout the school year including two major fundraising events. Families are encouraged to participate in any or all fundraising endeavors.

TUITION ARREARS

Tuition payments are due by the fifth of the month and may be made by pre-authorized payments or post-dated cheques, as indicated on the Tuition Payment Plan. Requests for any changes to the Tuition Payment Plan must be submitted to the Principal for approval.

To enable the School to continue to meet its ongoing operating commitments, it is essential that the Parents must contact the Principal in writing or in person immediately when circumstances change and a family experiences difficulty meeting its financial obligations. This will allow for a solution that considers the needs of the student(s), the family, and the School to be fairly and adequately considered.

Within 3 business days, the Finance Team will notify parents whose payments have not been received. If the payments cannot be made within a month, parents will be asked to schedule a meeting with the Principal and the Finance Team.

Following the meeting, the Parents and the Principal or the Finance Officer are to create an alternate plan for the payment of the tuition fees. To enable the School to continue to meet its ongoing operating commitments, The alternative plan will be structured to ensure all tuition arrears are cleared by the end of the current fiscal school year. For such situations, monthly statements of account will be sent to the Parents for ease of tracking payments received and outstanding amounts owing.

IV ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Base Christian School (BCS) seeks excellence in academics by providing a high-quality education within a positive and nurturing learning environment.

We are committed to offering students opportunities to discover their unique gifts and talents through a variety of experiences and specialized classes. BCS places a strong emphasis on its art, sports, and music programs, encouraging students to explore their creative and athletic abilities. Our Senior Kindergarten to Grade 8 programs meet or exceed the instructional time requirements outlined in the Education Act for publicly funded education.

COURSE OF STUDY

The course of study at BCS will provide the student with a level of academic education that is equivalent to the corresponding grade level in a public school. The course of study for the elementary grades will prepare the student for entrance into High School.

All textbooks and materials selected will be based on their suitability for study in a Christian environment. The basic skills, the building of Christian character and relationships will be emphasized both in and outside of the classroom. Curriculum documents are available for viewing at the school office.

All courses are taught in a teacher-directed format. Students receive the benefits of smaller class sizes and an environment that is conducive for spiritual and academic growth.

MEASURING STUDENT PROGRESS

Student progress is measured in a variety of ways at BCS. At least 50% of class time is spent teaching the core subjects of reading, writing, and mathematics. Regular assessments in these subject areas take the form of tests, quizzes, dictations, assignments, etc. In grades JK-8, progress reports and/or report cards are issued 3 times a year.

At BCS, we use letter grades on report cards to evaluate student performance, as guided by the Ontario Ministry of Education. This system ensures consistency and clarity in assessing how well students meet curriculum expectations. Letter grades provide an accessible way for parents and students to understand academic progress, highlighting areas of strength and growth. This approach reflects our commitment to supporting each student in their learning journey while maintaining alignment with provincial standards.

Parent/teacher interviews are held for all students in November/December and March as well as upon request at other times.

School wide parent meetings are held twice a year.

HOMEWORK

Assignments, which have not been completed at school, preparation for tests and completion of special reports and projects will constitute homework assignments. The responsibility for completion of homework assignments will assist in the development of the student's personal self-discipline in following through on what they have begun. This responsibility will encourage the wise use of time in the classroom. Normally, the amount of time spent on homework assignments increases with the age and grade level of the child.

Parents are asked to supervise their child's home study. Use this as an opportunity to work with your child to support them and keep informed as to what they are studying in school. Homework assignments and class news are posted on the BCS website.

MAP Growth Test

At Base Christian School (BCS), we administer the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) test twice or three times a year to assess students' academic growth and progress. This allows us to closely track each student's development in key areas such as Math, Reading, and Language throughout the year. By testing at three intervals, we can monitor improvement, adjust instructional strategies, and provide targeted support to help every student reach their full potential. The results from these assessments play a crucial role in guiding our teaching practices and ensuring that our students are on the path to success.

ATTENDANCE POLICY**School Hours**

School hours are from 8:45 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Late Arrivals or Early Departure Procedure

Students arriving late (after 8:50 AM) will be required to ring the doorbell at the School's front door to enter the school building.

During the school day, students will not be allowed to leave the school grounds unless the school administrator (admin@base.school) and child's homeroom teacher have received a notice through email from the Parent/Guardian who will be accompanying them.

Absences

Please email the school administrator ((admin@base.school) and homeroom teacher by 9:00 a.m. if their child will be absent that day and the reason for the absence.

Homeroom Teachers will inform the school administrator if the student is absent without notification by 9:15 a.m., then the school administrator will email parents. The students should not be released unless the current teacher has been notified by parents or the school administrator.

CHAPEL

The spiritual climate of our school is reinforced during our Chapel Services held each week. Parents are welcome to attend these chapel services at any time.

CHURCH ATTENDANCE

The primary responsibility for the education of a child is that of the parent. God has called Base Christian School to assist the parents in this instruction. We feel that the church is another prime figure in the full education of a child. For this reason, we strongly encourage all students to attend church services regularly each week. Base Church would be happy to welcome any students and their families if they do not already have a home church.

CLASS FIELD TRIPS

Class field trips will be scheduled throughout the year to supplement the classroom curriculum. A permission form must be signed by the parent/guardian and returned to the school in order for a student to participate in a field trip. Parents may be asked to assist as chaperones; however we request that siblings do not accompany parents on class trips. Assisting parents must make their own arrangements for care of siblings who are still at home.

BCS requires that each parent volunteer who desires to participate in class field trips must have an approved criminal record document prior to the trip. This may be facilitated through the BCS office.

On occasions when buses are used for transportation, all field trip participants will ride on the bus.

SCHOOL CLOSING / SEVERE WEATHER

BCS follows decisions made by the Waterloo Region District School Board (WRDSB) and Woodland High School's Transportation Service.

- WRDSB communicates their decision by 6:00 AM.
- If Woodland High School buses are cancelled, BCS will:
 - Cancel all BCS transportation.
 - Remain open unless WRDSB closes schools.
- If WRDSB schools are closed, BCS will be closed.
- Families choose whether to keep children home if they feel conditions are unsafe.

EXTREME TEMPERATURES

When local temperatures reach -20C wind chill students will be kept indoors for recess. Staff will provide due consideration to students who individually may experience pronounced impacts from extreme conditions.

HEALTH PRACTICES

The following is a list of regulations adopted for the control of contagious diseases. These regulations are for your protection. Please give full compliance. If any of these situations occur please notify the school.

Chicken Pox: Exclusion from school until all pox marks are dry and the child is free of fever. Re-entry to school requires a note from a parent.

Measles: Exclusion from school for at least six days from the onset of symptoms. Re-entry to school with a note from a parent.

Mumps: Exclusion from school for 9 days from onset of swelling. Re-entry to school with a note from a parent.

Tonsillitis: Exclusion from school and re-entry with a note from a parent.

Pink Eye: Exclusion from school until 24 hours after medical treatment has begun and discharge has ceased.

Lice: Exclusion from school until the child has been treated properly and all nits are removed.

Families are advised to take the usual measures to reduce the risk of transmission of the flu and respiratory illness, which include:

- if you or your family members are ill (vomiting or fever), stay home (Students MUST be fever free – without medication – for at least 24 hours before returning to school)
- if vomiting has occurred at school, children will be sent home and asked not to return until they are symptom free for 24 hours
- remind children to wash hands frequently and thoroughly with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer;
- cover their mouths and nose when they cough or sneeze;
- if they don't have a tissue, sneeze or cough into their sleeve or arm

LOCKER POLICY

Locker privileges are extended to students for use Monday to Friday during school hours..

Students are restricted from accessing their lockers alone or with friends outside school hours. However, with their parent's accompaniment and supervision, students may attend to their locker if access to a needed schoolbook or item cannot wait until the next school day. Students should learn to manage their books and belongings accordingly.

Only locks issued by the school are permitted at BCS. Each teacher and the office will keep a list of the

locker number and lock combination in the event that a student forgets his/her combination. As per school policy, the teacher or principal reserves the right to search a locker and its contents if a violation of school policy or civil law is suspected.

LUNCH HOUR

Lunch hour is from 11:40 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. (12-12:30: lunch recess) for grades JK – 8. Appropriate supervision will be provided. All students are required to remain at the school during lunch hour to eat in their classrooms.

RECOGNITION AND AWARDS

It is our objective at BCS to train students in behaviour patterns that will be helpful to themselves and to the school community in supporting and achieving goals of spiritual, intellectual, physical, and social development. In general, the overall focus we aim to maintain is positive reinforcement. We will continue to emphasize godly character and reinforce this with verbal praise, words of encouragement, notes, certificates, awards, and extra privileges. To support this end, we have a variety of awards that include a series of character recognition and leadership awards, academic awards, athletic awards, music awards, and dramatic arts awards. See the appendix for an overview of these awards.

SPORTS AND CAASO

BCS participates in sports tournaments with other Christian schools in Southwestern Ontario who are part of Christian Athletic Association of Schools Ontario (CAASO). Most teams are made up of grade 5-8 students, except for Cross Country and Track and Field which include students from Grade 3. BCS students have the opportunity to train in a full size gymnasium and participate in the following tournaments: Soccer, Cross Country, Volleyball, Bowling, Badminton, Basketball, Floor Hockey, and Track and Field.

SCHOOL OF MUSIC

BCS offers students the opportunity to receive private music tutoring lessons during the school day, including vocal training, piano, and worship instruments such as guitar, bass, drums, and more.

STUDENT CLUBS

At BCS, student clubs are open twice a year, once in each term, providing students an opportunity to showcase their creativity, leadership, and passions. Students are encouraged to propose new clubs, and upon approval and securing a staff chaperone, they can launch their club. We have hosted a variety of vibrant clubs in the past, including Chess Club, Rubik's Cube Club, Culture Club, Worship Dance Club, Crochet Club, Drama Club, and more. These clubs not only allow students to share their hobbies and interests but also help build leadership skills, foster community, and create lasting connections among peers.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Base Christian School, in its dedication to quality Christian education, is committed to building outstanding Christian character traits in the lives of its pupils. To accomplish such a goal, it is necessary that the school establishes standards of conduct and that the students be encouraged to maintain such standards by developing a disciplined lifestyle. Respect for authority, obedience, courtesy, and cooperation are some of the basic behaviour patterns expected of all.

- In passing through the halls, there is to be no running or excessive noise.
- Food and beverages will be consumed only in designated areas.
- Except those with specific responsibilities, students will not enter the building before 8:45 a.m. unless it is raining or the temperature is severe. Jr. and Sr. Kindergarten children are permitted to enter the school with a parent before 8:45 a.m.
- Students will leave the building immediately at dismissal time unless it is raining or extremely cold, in which case they may wait for rides inside the designated doors. Order must be maintained at all times.
- The gym is off limits unless the school staff has arranged specific activities.
- The church office and phones are off limits unless an emergency warrants such usage.
- Students will respect all school personnel in both action and word. The common courtesy of “please” and “thank you” and “yes” and “no” are expected. The use of profanity or vulgar language will not be tolerated. Teachers will also address students respectfully.
- There is to be no gum chewing at any time during school hours.
- Respect for fellow students and school property, including textbooks, is expected to be exemplary at all times. Students should maintain Christian standards and attitudes of honesty, courtesy, morality, and kindness.

BCS has adopted the following Code of Conduct as a benchmark for acceptable behaviour at the School:

- Honour God with your words, actions and attitudes
- Honour those in authority by listening and submitting to them
- Serve others by putting them first rather than yourselves
- Do all things as unto the Lord with a whole heart and effort

Any student who cannot remain in harmony with the rules and policies of the school may be dismissed from the school. In such cases, there will be no tuition refund for that month. Any remaining post-dated cheques will be returned.

DISCIPLINE POLICY

At Base Christian School, we believe that discipline is a vital part of education. As children learn to submit to authority (God, parent, teacher, etc.), this will enable them to be more effective Christian leaders in the

future. As staff and parents, we need to develop a lifestyle of submission to proper authority as an example to our children.

When there are issues that arise which require corrective measures, prayer should be a part of the process. A repentant heart should be sought; forgiveness and restoration are the desired results. It is our goal to use the situation to help the student learn from the correction rather than simply 'punishing' them for bad behaviour.

At the School, the common forms of discipline include, clean up duties, exclusion from some activities, withdrawal of privileges, detentions, etc. The use of a Behavioral Tracking System involving the use of merits and demerits has been implemented in the middle grades. In all cases, teachers will be guided by Christian love as God's example has shown us.

It is our desire to maintain standards of behaviour with an attitude of kindness, Christian love, and genuine regard for the student both in the classroom and on the playground. It is hoped that parents and teachers will cooperate fully with one another in the matter of student behaviour; therefore, parental support will be sought early in the discipline process. Good teacher – student – home rapport, combined with loving discipline by the teacher and parent, will usually alleviate most problems.

A. When a student's attitude, conduct or behaviour warrants corrective measures, the following steps will be followed at the teacher's discretion:

- Immediate removal of the student from the situation for a "cool down" period
- Discussion with the student's teacher/ supervisor (and principal if deemed necessary) regarding the seriousness of the act should occur and appropriate consequences set
- Consequences will vary from verbal reproof, detention (recess or lunch time), loss of privilege, work assignment related to the offence and may include a half day in-school suspension with the parents being informed of the action and consequences
- The student will complete or dictate to the teacher the "BCS Reflection Sheet" outlining the problem that they were involved in, how they could have handled things differently, how they took responsibility and resolved the problem and a scripture to meditate upon
- A copy of this form will be kept on file and another sent home to the parent

B. These steps will be followed for behavioral problems that tend to persist over a longer period of time:

- Student will be taken to the principal, parents will be contacted for a personal interview and consequences set by the principal in consultation with the parent. The personal interview will be with the parent, student, teacher and principal.
- There will be attempts to assist the student and parent(s) with prayer, counseling, and other applicable resources
- One-day in-school suspension set by the principal and the parents contacted
- Two-day suspension from school set by the principal and the parents contacted
- One-week suspension
- Expulsion

The School reserves the right to suspend or expel any student who exhibits an attitude and /or behaviour that, in the opinion of the Principal and staff, is harmful to the physical or emotional well-being of the staff and/or students or is damaging to the reputation of the School. Violation of the laws of the land, whether at school or in the community, are also grounds for expulsion.

If problems or disagreements arise during the school year between parents and the School staff, it is extremely important for the best interest of your child and the School that they are dealt with in a Christian

manner. According to Matthew 18:15-17 we believe that the following procedure will serve this end:

1. Talk with the staff member closest to the problem, preferably after school hours.
2. If you are unable to get the problem resolved, you should request a conference with the principal and the staff member.
3. Should the problem still remain unresolved, you may request, in writing, the assistance of the BCS Board of Directors.

PARENT COMMITMENT

It is our desire to establish a functioning school community where teachers, children, and parents work together in the pursuit of academic excellence and in the building of relationships with God and one another. Therefore, it is important for you as a parent to clearly understand the Goals and Statement of Faith of Base Christian School in order that you may give your full support to the administration, teaching staff, and program in which your child will be involved. ***The following outlines the commitment you made by sending your children to Base Christian School.***

- You are in agreement with the school's basic philosophy of education and understand that the Christian principles, as put forth in the Statement of Faith, are the foundation upon which the school will operate.
- You accept the role Base Christian School will play in assisting you to train up your children.
- You understand that you have an obligation to be actively involved in the academic education of your children. You agree to uphold and support the high academic standards of the school by encouraging your children in the completion of any assignments.
- You will faithfully support the school through your prayers. You will handle any issues that arise concerning the school by first bringing them to the attention of the appropriate school personnel.
- You understand that the standards of Base Christian School will not tolerate profanity or obscenity either in word or action. Disrespect for the Word of God, school personnel, or other students will not be allowed. Continued disobedience to the established policies of the school will be dealt with in consultation with students, teachers, and parents.
- You understand that assessments will be made to cover damage to school property (including breakage of windows, abuse of books and equipment, etc.) by your child.
- You will support the school by involvement in Parent-Teacher conferences, school-sponsored meetings, activities, fundraising, workdays, and parent volunteer functions.
- You understand and will fulfill your financial commitment to pay for the educational services the school is providing for your child.
- You understand that your child's admission to the school is subject to administrative approval and possible academic testing. All pertinent information regarding your child will be made available to the school administration.
- You understand that failure of the parents or child to comply with the established regulations and discipline, parental commitment, or failure to meet financial obligations will forfeit the student's privilege of attending.

PARENT COMMUNICATION

To maintain a harmonious partnership between the home and the school, good communication is essential. To help facilitate this, we offer:

- Weekly newsletters sent by email to update parents on regular school calendar items and special upcoming events.
- Parent/Teacher Journals sent home regularly throughout the school year
- Parent Meetings designed for mutual edification and support
- Three sets of report cards (October - Progressive Report Card, February - Term 1 Report Card, June - Term 2 Report Card)
- Parent/Teacher Interviews held in November, February, and upon request
- Prompt telephone contact from teachers if any concerns arise at any point during the school year

- Willingness for teachers to meet with parents at a mutually agreeable time after school

Please note: Parents are not to call school staff at their homes about academic matters. Please call the office during school hours and arrange a convenient time with the appropriate teacher.

PARENT MEETINGS

Parent Meetings are planned during the school year to offer support and provide a way to communicate various business and school issues throughout the year. Attendance at these meetings is mandatory as outlined in your commitment to the School when you register each year. If there is a conflict due to an emergency or work-related reason, please contact the school office before the meeting.

CAR POOLING

Car-pooling between families is encouraged for those attending Base Christian School. A family directory is available to assist in making these arrangements.

Please note:

- The School reserves the right to change any policies in this handbook from time to time as it sees fit without prior notice to parents.
- The School will attempt to keep tuition increases as low as possible but because future economic conditions cannot be projected an increase may be required.
- In the area of discipline, the School reserves the right to suspend or expel a student whose behaviour on or off school premises is disruptive, harmful to others, or illegal. This action may be taken at any time.
- The School reserves the right to search lockers, gym bags, backpacks, or school totes without prior notice for fire safety, health concerns or whenever a violation of school rules is suspected.
- The School reserves the right to accept, reject, retain, or dismiss any student at any time during the school year without prior notice. This is for the well-being of other students, teachers and for the school's reputation.

PARENT VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT

At Base Christian School, we believe that parent engagement is an essential part of a child's education. Our goal is to nurture a thriving partnership between family and school, not as two separate spheres, but as one community working together for the flourishing of every child.

Parent volunteering is about building community, supporting learning, and cultivating a shared vision for Christ-centered education.

Why BCS Offers Parent Volunteering

At BCS, parent volunteering is more than simply helping out. It's a vital part of our mission to build a Christ-centered learning community. We believe that God calls families, churches, and schools to work together in raising the next generation for His Kingdom.

APPENDIX A APPEARANCE AND GROOMING GUIDELINES

Parents are asked to monitor the dress and grooming of their children in accordance with these guidelines. We hope the outward appearance will be a true witness of the Spirit and of the inward attitude being developed in the student. One's appearance should honour the Lord.

GENERAL CLOTHING GUIDELINES

- Modesty, cleanliness, appropriateness, and Christian testimony should guide dress for all occasions.
- Jackets and non-uniform sweaters are not to be worn in the school. Sweaters, jackets and shirts are not to be worn tied around the waist or hung over the shoulders. The school zip jacket or cardigan sweater is an optional purchase available from McCarthy Uniforms.
- Hats are not allowed in the classrooms, this includes the gymnasium.
- Shirts must be tucked in. Belts are to be worn with pants and shorts (grades 3 and up).
- Clothes shall be in good repair and of appropriate size. No faded or patched pants.
- The dress code will be maintained during school hours while the student is on the BCS campus. (ie. this includes the time from dismissal to when students are picked up)

GROOMING GUIDELINES

- Appearance shall be neat, clean, and modest.
- Hair shall be neat, clean and well groomed. Hair colouring shall not be dramatically different from the student's natural hair colour. Modest highlights are permissible, but numerals, designs, striping, heads shaved bald, and mohawks are not acceptable.
- Jewelry, bracelets, necklaces, hair accessories etc. should not be of an overly conspicuous nature.
- Body piercing and tattoos are not acceptable at the School.
- No jewelry or watches should be worn during Phys Ed.

BCS UNIFORM ITEMS

CHARACTER RECOGNITION and LEADERSHIP AWARDS

1. **Servant Heart Award** – Grades 1-8 (1-3 per grade)
Presented to students monthly who have demonstrated a readiness to serve in various capacities at BCS and who demonstrate godly leadership and attitudes among fellow students. Servant Heart Award winners are also acknowledged every month at the end of month chapel.
2. **WD MacIntosh Award (graduating grade 8 student)**
Presented in memory of William MacIntosh, educator for 57 years, to a graduating grade 8 student who has shown the most improvement in attitude and academics during his or her attendance at BCS.

ACADEMIC AWARDS (grades 7/8)

1. **Honour Roll**
After each reporting period, any student who achieves a minimum percent average of 80% with no single subject mark below 65% will have his/her name placed on the Honour Roll under the appropriate grade heading. Certificates are handed out each term and will be in the Report Card envelope. “All Year Honour Roll” awards are presented to students who have earned Honour Roll standing in all terms.
2. **Honours with Distinction Roll**
After each reporting period, any student who achieves a minimum percent average of 85% but no single mark below 75% will have his/her name placed on the Honours with Distinction Roll under the appropriate grade heading.
3. **Top of the Class Awards**
Presented to a student in each grade (7/8) who has earned the highest academic average.

ATHLETIC AWARDS

1. **Honourable Athletes Award – Grades 3-8 (2 per grade)**
Presented to students who achieve a minimum grade of 80% (or an A) in Phys Ed, and who demonstrate godly character and attitude in their athletic experience.
2. **Courageous in Spirit Award - Graduating Class**
This is the top athletic award and is presented to the student(s) who best demonstrates an overall well-balanced approach to athletics. They give 100% consistently. They are very coachable and willing to learn, and they are looked up to and respected by their teammates. They are leaders, not only because of their athletic abilities, but also because of strong Christ-like character both on and off the field.

MUSIC AWARDS

1. **Musical Excellence Award – Grades 5-8 (2 per grade)**
Awarded to students who are skillful musicians having developed their musical ability and level of performance throughout the entire year. Recipients of this award will have achieved a minimum overall grade of 80% (A) in Music.

3. **Asaph Award of Distinction - Graduating class**
This award is the top musical award. The recipient(s) achieves a top level of overall musicianship and contributes significantly to the music program at the School. They have exceeded the expectations of the music program by their attitude, leadership and stewardship of the musical gift they have been given.

CHARACTER

All students need role models. The character qualities can be taught and illustrated through stories of famous people. Literary characters are also powerful. Students also need teachers and leaders who exemplify positive character qualities.

The mentoring relationship – one-on-one wherever possible – is a further key to embedding these qualities and developing character through a positive and healthy relationship which encourages and challenges.

The character qualities also need to be considered in relation to curriculum as ‘principles of wisdom’. The qualities and stories can be explored weekly through assemblies and tutor groups.

We are pleased to offer a part time experience for homeschooling families. This information pertains to part time students only and should serve to make your experience at BCS successful.

DROP OFF & PICK UP PROCEDURES

The part-time program officially begins at 11:40 AM on Tuesdays & Thursdays, part-time students are expected to come and eat lunch with their classmates at that time. The BCS entrances are open at 11:30 AM and students are able to come in and proceed to their lockers, put away their things and gather their lunch, entering quietly into their classrooms as classes are still in session. This early arrival is important for these reasons:

- if a part-time student is on a sports team, there often are practices at noon
- if a teacher needs to talk with/help/spend time with a student, lunch recess is a good window to do that
- eating lunch with their peers helps them to feel a part of the class and to develop relationships and friendships
- generally all announcements which part-timers need to hear are handled in the few minutes before the lunch bell rings at 11:40; that way they are “in the loop” and ready to begin with class as soon as they come in from lunch recess

Students in JK-Gr. 4 may enter through the BCS main entrance and be accompanied by a parent to their hooks.

Students in Gr. 5-8 may enter through the entrance on the pathway facing the small parking lot and proceed to their lockers.
