Dear Professor Anderson,

I am writing to you today as a student and member of the ANU community to express my concern with the university's approach to addressing SASH.

The university consistently speaks of whole-of-community approaches to addressing SASH yet does not actually give power to students when it comes to engaging in cultural and institutional change at this university. Issues such as failing to listen directly to survivors' lived experiences, prioritising the university's reputational and financial interests ahead of students, and under-resourcing critical student wellbeing support services consistently leave students in a dangerous position.

I am concerned that the ANU's current plan fails to address several issues that students have consistently raised with the university, including:

- The lack of an intersectional approach to addressing SASH. SASH is a complex problem, and a complex problem requires a wide range of complex and developed solutions, including addressing racism, homophobia, transphobia, and ableism on campus.
- No student consultation on the future pastoral care model to be adopted in SA8.
- The lack of publicly available Cultural Action Plans in residential halls.
- The lack of transparency on key information and documents, such as a full response to the Broken Promises Response.

Unlike previous responses, I sincerely hope that the ANU responds in a timely fashion. There is still no official response to the Too Little Too Late recommendations earlier this year, and the most recent Student Safety and Wellbeing Plan fails to account for several student demands.
