National Endowment for the Humanities: Professional Development Programs (with stipends available)

Suggested Audience: Educators

NEH offers tuition-free opportunities for K-12 educators and higher education faculty to study a variety of humanities topics. Stipends of \$1300-\$3450 for residential programs and \$650-\$1725 for virtual programs help cover expenses for these one- to four-week programs. Applications for all programs close on March 3, 2023.

Professional development programs include the following format options:

- Residential: All participants attend for the duration of the project at the host site.
- Virtual: All participants attend for the duration of the project using an online platform. This can include synchronous and asynchronous sessions.
- Combined Format: All participants attend a portion of the project online and a portion of the project at the host site. Online and residential sessions occur at different times, but participants attend the same format simultaneously.

To be eligible for CalKIDS, participants must be born in California on or after July 1, 2022 or an eligible low-income public school student in grades 1-12 in California. All participants receive a seed deposit in a CalKIDS account to help pay for future education after high school.

Inspiring Investigation: Interpreting and Analyzing Figurative Language

Suggested Audience: High School English teachers



This Tools for Teachers instructional resource (account required)—provides high school teachers with step-by-step directions for how to guide students to recognize, analyze, and explain the meaning of figurative language in a text and the impact it has on the overall meaning and tone, using William Wordsworth's poem "I Wandered Lonely as a Cloud". Habits of Mind strategies are embedded in the questions which challenge students to use critical and close reading.

Three levels of reading questions are provided for the teacher to use with students, depending on the support. This resource is included in the English language arts/literacy Interim Assessment Connections Playlist for high school—Read Literary Texts. Each playlist consists of instructional resources that can be used to teach the content assessed on the corresponding Interim Assessment Block.

Watsonville is in the Heart: Community Archive

Suggested Audience: History Teachers



The Watsonville is in the Heart digital archive preserves and uplifts the stories of the "manong" generation (Ilokano/Tagalog for "older brother"), the first wave of Filipino migrant farmworkers to arrive in the United States at the beginning of the 20th century. The collection focuses on the pioneering families of Watsonville and the greater Pajaro Valley.

The digital archive includes oral histories, family photographs, family heirlooms, letters and correspondences, and newspaper clippings along with a lesson plan designed to introduce students to oral history through

the Watsonville is in the Heart oral history collection. Two primary objectives guided the creation of this lesson plan: 1) To increase the accessibility of oral history methods and archival collections for educators and students and 2) To empower students to learn about their families and communities through hands-on engagement with oral history research.

Now that Proposition 28 passed in November, here is what we know.

Proposition 28 Information Sheet from EdSource



Highlights quoted from <a>EdSource:

- On Nov. 8, Californians overwhelmingly passed Proposition 28, which will bring a windfall of arts education funding to California schools.
- In all, districts will receive an additional 1% of their funding allotment to spend on the arts.
- Proposition 28 funds will be distributed according to enrollment, with 70% based on overall enrollment and 30% based on Title 1 enrollment.
- School boards must certify districts' Prop. 28 budgets annually.
- Proposition 28 will provide funding for traditional forms of creative expression like music, theater, dance and visual arts, as well as media arts including filmmaking, animation and graphic design.
- A novel feature of Prop. 28 is each school community will get to decide how the funds are used...Families can help decide what they want for their children.
- The passage of Prop. 28 makes California a leader in arts education and will lead to the largest investment in arts and music in our nation's history.
- Longer term, Prop. 28 will lead to greater diversity in the technology, media and entertainment industries as a broader population of students in California public schools will develop newfound skills and experiences.
- Prop. 28 will create more than 15,000 additional jobs for teachers and teachers' aides as well as in community arts organizations.


