Community Forum on Child Care in Oklahoma

As a result of our discussion with Senator Ikley-Freeman at the September 2019 Breakfast Meet-Up, we are considering a community forum on the accessibility of child care. She had originally proposed a study in the Oklahoma Senate, but the committee chair did not approve it. She suggested the next step be community forums to garner public interest/support, with the hopes that this would help get a study approved next year (interim studies happen Aug-Oct). The study would help to clarify the problems and identify viable solutions.

- The status of H.R. 2740: Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, Defense, State, Foreign Operations, and Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act, 2020 – This bill is provisionally dead due to a failed vote for cloture on September 18, 2019. The Senate may try again. This is the bill referenced in the OK Policy article we read for the meeting, which is supposed to provide another increase in the CCDBG funding for FY20.
- The Oklahoma Watch article mentioned that in summer 2019 DHS was supposed to be considering increasing the income threshold for families to receive the child care subsidy. I did a cursory search to check the status of this, but didn't have any luck.
