Time Survey: What is Your Time Really Worth

Directions: Students need to take the Time Use <u>survey</u> prior to class (Student Time: <=5 minutes). Instructors may create a discussion forum for students to answer parts a and b so students can view the variability in the data prior to class.

Instructors may allow students a chance to compose their answers individually to parts c and d before opening up class discussion. Time: 5-7 minutes.

Learning Objectives:

At the end of this resource students will be able to:

- 1. Explain how scarcity and choice are central to economics.
- 2. Apply the concepts of scarcity in real-life contexts.
- 3. Evaluate the opportunity cost of your personal time.
- 1. Take the survey at this link. After taking the survey, answer the following questions:
- a. Did the survey suggest that it was worth it for you to hire a service to complete laundry or other personal errands? If so, what would you be doing instead of laundry or errands?
 Answer: Students should begin thinking of their first best alternatives.
- b. At what rate should you take on additional part-time work according to this tool? Is the estimate higher or lower than what you currently earn for part-time work?

 Answer: Higher, lower, or the same.
- c. Which economic concept(s) does this survey best reflect? **Answer: Opportunity cost, scarcity**
- d. Do you think you have underestimated the value of your time given the survey results? Explain. Answer: Students are generally quite surprised by the results and the exercise demonstrates the importance of an economic principle in their everyday life early in the course.
