Our faith compels us to individually and collectively take appropriate actions of conservation and adaptation. We can act; we must act guickly.

1. Cut down on the amount of energy you consume

- a. Swap incandescent bulbs for LED lights
- b. Lower hot water usage & fix leaky faucets

3. Support access and adaptation to renewable energy

- a. Choose green power as your electric source
- b. Advocate for state legislation that advances renewable energy production
