- East Campus Plan
 - Adopted in 2003
- 1744 Moss Street was donated to the UO and has been rezoned
- Review of UO East Campus Lands Zoning map and overview of new buildings since plan was adopted

- Not imminent, but the East Campus Plan will need to be updated soon.
- “The graceful edge” is not anticipated to change due to HB 2001 and recent middle housing allowance

Eugene Water & Electric Board Update ([View EWEB Presentation Slides](#))

- Emergency Water Stations
 - Need to diversify and add water stations to anticipate emergencies
 - There are currently five in the city
 - Closest to Fairmount Neighborhood is at Lane Events Center, 796 W 13th Ave
 - Future Emergency Water Site will be located at Amazon Park
- McKenzie Watershed
 - Holiday Farm Fire Restoration included the following work:
 - Fuels reduction
 - Erosion control
 - Native planting
 - Invasive species removal
 - Other large-scale restoration to reduce sediment, keep water cool and shaded
- Electrification
 - Distinct from decarbonization
 - EWEB is electrifying their fleet
 - Electrification Impact Analysis Report Phasing

Eugene City Update

Alan Zelanka - Eugene City Councilor, Ward 3

Councilor Zelenka described the issues the city is currently working on:

- Community Survey:
 - The biggest issues were: #1 - Homelessness, #2 - Public Safety, #3 - Climate Change
 - Only 30% of people think Eugene is going in the right direction
- City Budget:
 - Is 2 million over and cuts need to be made, which they are considering how
- Fireworks Ban:
 - The city is proposing a ban on fireworks.
 - They hope to put some money towards public firework shows.

- Climate Friendly Communities:
 - This is an unfunded mandate from the state down to cities
 - Need to reduce and regulate parking
 - Designate climate friendly corridors that are walkable
 - Connecting land use and transportation together to reduce greenhouse gas emissions
- Bethel Area Public Health Overlay:
 - Planning to protect residents from future industries that will have detrimental environmental impacts

In response to questions, Councilor Zelenka additionally discussed:

- Community Safety Initiative Payroll Tax:
 - This will increasingly improve the city's public safety system to combat increasing crime
 - More police officers will be hired, but they are hard to find
- Reduction of Natural Gas:
 - Is only 3% of the overall greenhouse gas problem, over 40% comes from transportation
 - Allowing people to have gas stoves and fireplaces would still let us meet climate goals
- CAHOOTS:
 - Is integrated with our 911 system to save money
 - Can better send the appropriate level of support to resolve situations, such as police in violent situations or just CAHOOTS staff
- Suggestion to rename Fairmount park after Art Johnson: The city's naming policy is at:

- The homeless problem has three root causes:
 - Substance abuse
 - Mental health
 - Affordable housing
- UO Practice Complex Swap:
 - The council is looking to approve a proposed land swap with U of O to build a new indoor practice facility.
- Parking enforcement:
 - It became lax during COVID and due to parking staff shortages.
 - It has hard to acquire needed parking staff
