The 2022 Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association's Class 1A East League Girls Volleyball Championship tournament is scheduled for Saturday, November 5 at Elko High School.

LOCATION

GENERAL INFORMATION

Region qualifying and tournament format
 The top six (6) teams in the East League, based on final regular-season standings,
 qualify for the 2022 NIAA Class 1A East League Girls Volleyball Championship
 tournament. The tournament will have a single-elimination bracket. Each match will be
 the best-of-5 sets.

2. State qualifying

The top two (2) teams (champion and runner-up) from the East League tournament advance to the 2022 NIAA Class 1A State girls volleyball championship tournament.

3. Rules

National Federation volleyball rules, the NIAA Handbook, the NIAA Reference Manual and this tournament information packet will govern the tournament. This information packet is a binding document for the rules and regulations of this tournament.

4. Official ball

The official ball for all NIAA post-season volleyball tournaments is the Molten Soft Touch IV58L-3, multi-colored panel ball.

5. Program information (team picture and detailed roster) should be submitted as soon as possible to: Lori Lotts (<u>llotts@niaa.com</u>).

6. Sportsmanship

Citizenship, sportsmanship and crowd/fan etiquette policies should be followed by coaches, players and spectators as outlined in the NIAA's Citizenship Through Sports Manual. NO thundersticks, confetti, megaphones, cowbells, whistles, sirens, airhorns, objects that would impair spectator vision (such as balloons) or other such devices will be permitted at the matches. NIAA Handbook regulations with regards to behavior, ejections, etc. will be enforced.

7. Home team

The higher seeded team is the home team. Please check the volleyball bracket (linked on the volleyball main page) for more information.

8. Warm-ups

Each team will be allowed eight (8) minutes of warm-up time. The visiting team will go first.

9. Tournament passes

A total of fifteen (15) player and manager passes will be provided for each team. Coaches will be given their passes upon checking in at the tournament. No players or managers will be admitted without a pass.

10. Locker rooms

Girls locker rooms will be available in the gymnasium. Players should bring their own locks and towels. Teams are not to enter the locker room until after the preceding match has started. Coaches will be responsible for the conduct of their teams in the locker room.

11. Athletic trainer

The NIAA has recommended a trainer be present at all tournaments.

12. Ticketing

ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAMS

The NIAA does not recognize nor permit the selection of all-tournament teams. The NIAA philosophy is league/region and state tournaments are team competitions. Recognizing a small group of individuals often creates animosity among the large group of individuals not selected for these types of awards.

The exception to this philosophy would be if a media outlet selects an all-tournament team with no affiliation to the NIAA or its tournament staff.
