

## What is the Cambridge Program?

The Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) is an international diploma program offered through Cambridge University in





Cambridge curriculum and assessments are designed with five Learner Attributes in mind:

Confident in working with information and ideas, their own and those of others

Responsible for themselves and responsible to and respectful of others

Reflective as learners, developing their ability to learn

Innovative and equipped for new and future challenges

**Engaged** intellectually and socially, ready to make a difference

#### **Structure**

Cambridge uses the structure of the British education system, so the structure and terminology are unfamiliar. Essentially, there are two levels of courses that CMS uses: IGCSE (International General Certificate of Secondary Education) and AICE (Advanced International Certificate).

**IGCSE Courses** are honors-level courses, usually taken in the 9th-11th grades, that prepare students for the AICE diploma track.

AICE Diploma/AICE Courses are college-level courses and a qualifying exam score can be used for college credit. AICE courses are designated as either "AS level" or "A level." AS level courses are one year, and A level courses are two years. The AICE diploma is awarded to students who achieve a minimum of seven credits in AICE (AS or A level) courses. Students start taking these courses in 10th grade and they must take one from each of groups 1-4.

### **College Credit Policies**

Cambridge qualifications are accepted at universities all over the world, including all eight Ivy League schools. The Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina System adopted the Cambridge AICE credit acceptance policy in November 2019. Under this policy, students who earn a score of "C" or higher on their Cambridge exams will receive credit from all 16 universities in the system. A score of "C" is equivalent to a "B" in the US system.

### **How Would This Impact Existing Programs?**

All existing programs would continue, including AOE, CTE, and AP. Students can earn a Cambridge diploma (or take IGCSE, AS, or A level courses of their choosing) while participating in other programs. Some AP courses may transition to a comparable AS/A course.

Wherever there is an IGCSE course option, it would serve as the honors level course. Example: we would offer English I and IGCSE English I. The IGCSE course would be the honors level course for all students, regardless if they intend to take AS/A courses in the future.

### **Would Cambridge Students Be Cohorted?**

Because all Independence students are eligible to take Cambridge courses, students would not be cohorted. Students who intend to earn the AICE Diploma would naturally have several classes in common.

#### Rollout

We would begin to offer some IGCSE courses next fall, as well as English General Paper AS (recommended before taking content-area AS/A courses). 9th and 10th grade students would be eligible to earn the AICE diploma starting next year. We would continue to increase Cambridge courses in subsequent years.
