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Akongā/Student Instructions - Outline of the assessment:

You have 10 tasks to complete for credits from both of the following standards. Each standard generates evidence that you will see matches up on your checklist of things to complete. These two standards are rather reliant on you having completed 2.1, specifically the PPMTs and the Art Design principles. It is harder to complete this standard without these. Your teacher will give you some assistance here and if you have not achieved 2.1 already, this may be able to be counted towards that completion for an achieved grade only.

You have four expectations to complete a peer/group critique. This is a fundamental part of 2.3. It is unavoidable. This is essential to you developing, clarifying and extending ideas. Nothing happens in a vacuum.

You have eight weeks to complete this body of work, but sooner may be arranged if we are on track.

By the end of this you should have at least half a panel of work on panel one for your 2.4 12 credit folio as well.

Tekau Waihanga Ngohe|Create Task 10

Include the work you have done to date in some way, as a part of your introductory series of your folio. Go back to series and sequences. Your teacher may have a task at this point to teach to specifically, otherwise review your own notes and consider this idea carefully before progressing.

Consider the following: what are you trying to start with and say in your art works? What does your viewer need to see first in order to understand this?

Use planning pages and record everything. Create a couple of A3 pages of thumbnail sketches full of annotations and ideas. Use painting where appropriate in the planning pages.

On your digital folio (google drawing)

A minimum of one half of your folio is to be covered in work: you have initial shots that explore how your camera operates in relation to your methods and techniques in your artists. These would probably be smaller to start with and introductory in nature.

You have then reshot focussing on the methods and techniques that help you introduce your kaupapa strongly. For instance, if you are focussing on telling grandmas story, you might be using still life, and there could be a focus on directional lighting and shadows, creating leading lines.
