Result and Discussion

Result: Presents the research findings objectively using text, tables, or figures without excessive interpretation.

Discussion: Interprets the findings by linking them to theories or previous studies, and explains their meaning and implications.

1. Tables

All tables should be numbered with Arabic numerals. Every table should have a caption. Headings should be placed above tables, left justified. Only horizontal lines should be used within a table, to distinguish the column headings from the body of the table, and immediately above and below the table. Tables must be embedded into the text and not supplied separately. Below is an example which the authors may find useful.

2. Figure Placement

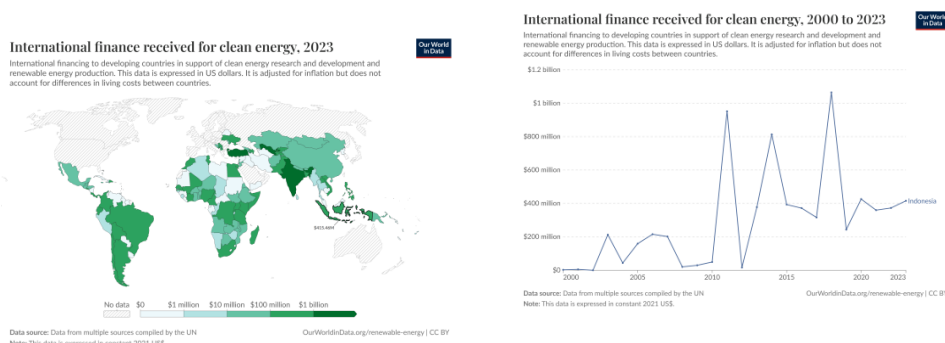


Figure1. (a) first picture; (b) second picture.

All figures should be numbered with Arabic numerals (1, 2, 3,...). Every figure should have a caption. All photographs, schemes, graphs and diagrams are to be referred to as figures. Low-quality scans are not acceptable. Figures must be embedded into the text and not supplied separately. In MS word input the figures must be properly coded. Preferred format of figures are PNG, JPEG, GIF etc. Lettering and symbols should be clearly defined either in the caption or in a legend provided as part of the figure. Figures should be placed at the top or bottom of a page wherever possible, as close as possible to the first reference to them in the paper. Please ensure that all the figures are of 300 DPI resolutions as this will facilitate good output. The figure number and caption should be typed below the illustration in 8 pt and left justified [Note: one-line captions of length less than column width (or full typesetting width or oblong) centered]. For example, see Fig. 1.
